Senate has already approved the juris doctor (JD) degree to be offered by the Faculty of Law. The proposed calendar change describes the required courses in the first year of the program, which include: Canadian Constitutional Law, Contract Law, Criminal Law, Foundations of Canadian Law, Native Cdn World Views and Law, Professional Responsibility, Property Law and Tort Law.

These descriptions are all new additions in the Academic Calendar.

Rationale of the Proposed Calendar Change(s):

The first year law courses need to be approved by Senate and put in the academic calendar prior to the start of the law program in September, 2013.

Description: Explores the basic principles of contract law from formation of a contract to remedies available for breach of contract.

Law 1XXX Criminal Law

Credit Weighting: 1.0

Description: Criminal law is a survey course intended to introduce students to substantive and procedural aspects of Canadian criminal law. The "substantive" portion of the course is concerned with defining "criminal" conduct and the recognition of defences. The "procedural" portion provides a broad overview of the criminal process, examines the impact of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, and explores protections for individual rights under criminal law.

Law 1XXX Foundations of Canadian Law

Credit Weighting: 0.5

Description: Provides an introduction to the sources of Canadian common law and statute law, principles of interpretation, legal analysis and legal research.

Offering: 2-1; 0-0

Law 1XXX Native Cdn World Views and Law

Credit Weighting: 0.5

Description: Introduces students to world views from the perspective of Aboriginal Peoples in Canada and how these perspectives fit within the legal system.

Law 1XXX Professional Responsibility

Credit Weighting: 0.5

Description: Professional Responsibility provides a general introduction to the issues and problems of professional responsibility and the ethics of lawyering.

Description: Examines law associated with real and personal property with special emphasis on Aboriginal and natural resource law issues.
