Course Description: A study of the social aspects of law: the passage of laws; the profession and practice of law; the use of law for social control; and, the law as a means of conflict resolution. Emphasis is given to the topic of social change via law reform in Canada.

Course Aims: In addition to the course description above, this course will (1) discuss the relevance of law within society; (2) introduce students to the sociology of law as an academic discipline; and, (3) to help students develop their presentation as well as intellectual skills - such as critical thinking.

Course Organization: This course is organized around lectures, classroom discussion of the readings and other materials, and other classroom activities, such as group work. Students should feel free to ask questions at any time and to respect the right of their classmates to do so.
