**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** A brief introduction to doing social research. This second year university-level course covers a broad range of topics, including a look at human ethics, survey design, measurement issues, quantitative and qualitative methods, etc. A variety of learning and evaluation strategies are deployed.

# Performance Assessment – C One-Page Abstract (Value = 5 %)

#### **Target Competency**

Help develop critical thinking skills.

Develop a plan for dissemination.

Build research literature review and writing skills.

#### **Directions**

Using the posted abstract guide (found in Desire2Learn), develop an abstract on a topic related to the social sciences, but <u>different</u> from the topic you used for your virtual poster. Step 1: locate on the Internet an upcoming social science related conference that has a call for abstracts (that are peer-reviewed). Step 2: print out the guideline they provide related to their call for abstracts (include this with your submitted abstract). Step 3: develop an abstract as though you wanted to (could) attend the conference. Write your abstract as though it would be reviewed by a panel of experts. Note: in real life (at most of the credible conferences) not all abstracts are accepted for presentation.

#### **Preparation and Participation**

Inquiry-based learning demands participation. Students should not only show up for classes but also to be actively engaged with the subject matter. Benefits? Students who are actively engaged, and have regular attendance, often do better academically than those who do not.

Sample Learning Strategy 1: (a) be presented a problem; (b) group up; (c) each group separately discusses material; (d) each group then formulate ideas / solutions; then (e) share ideas with entire class.

Sample Learning Strategy 2: (a) form a group; (b) be provided a question followed by a list of potential answers; (c) each group writes down their choice of what the best answer is; (d) the facilitator asks each group to discuss their answer - why they (you) believe it is the best answer; (e) class is then provided the correct answer by the facilitator and reasons why it is the best answer (based on the text and/or literature).

About Your Instructor: Dr. Kevin Willison has 14 years (plus) research experience. Not only has he completed three exhaustive thesis documents he has also worked on funded research projects with the University of Toronto, the National Initiative for Care of the Elderly (NICE), Toronto General Hospital; and Lakehead University (Thunder Bay). His most recent funded research (2010-2012) considered best ways to define and measure elder abuse. Since September of 2007 Kevin has had the opportunity to teach at Lakehead University (Orillia campus). Collectively, he has seven years of Ontario post-secondary school teaching experience. Dr. Willison has also taught at the Michener Institute for Applied Health Sciences, Ryerson University, Humber College (each based in Toronto), plus McMaster University in Hamilton and Sheridan College in Oakville (Ont.). Born and raised in Orillia, he attended Park Street Collegiate for grade nine and Twin Lakes Secondary for grade ten before moving to Windsor Ontario at the age of 15. Dr. Kevin Willison received his B.A. (Honors) from Queen's University in Kingston Ontario (Major: Sociology), his M.A. from Lakehead University in Thunder Bay (Major: Sociology), and his Ph.D. from the University of Toronto (Major: Community Health - within the Division of Social and Behavioral Health Sciences). His Ph.D. studies integrated such diverse disciplines as Public Health, Health Sociology and, Social Psychology. His interest in Sociology stems in part by his long-term focus on social justice and equity issues. He has a particular interest in the field of medical Sociology / health services research. To date, Dr. Willison has produced 11 peer-reviewed journal articles, two book chapters and one book. He has presented at over 27 conferences across Canada and is currently a Board Member of the Ontario Healthy Communities Coalition.
