<p>Rationale 1. The current structure of the Criminology program has several overlapping methods courses, without students learning about many aspects of research pertinent to Criminology, e.g. legal database searches, understanding and working with police statistics, freedom of information requests, unique ethical issues, etc. A new course is necessary to cover this important content. 2. By adding Criminology 2090, the previously borrowed methods courses from Psychology and Sociology (Psychology 2101 and Sociology 2911 and 3310) will no longer be required and can be removed from the calendar entry.</p>

<p>EffectonTeachingLoads Yes. Enrolment in Criminology has grown to such an extent that extent sections of required methods courses for Criminology students are needed anyway. By replacing 1.5 FCEs of Psychology and Sociology methods courses with .5 CE of Criminology methods (and .5 FCE of Criminology theory), the program will have increased flexibility and place less strain on other disciplines.</p>
