

Provost's Report to Senate

September 2017

Strategic Enrolment Management (SEM)

During the last academic year, nearly all of the academic units participated in developing a first round of multi-year enrolment forecasts at the program level. This was the first of many future cycles in a comprehensive approach to multi-year enrolment planning that will inform how all units of the University operate. In addition to the discussions we will be continuing to have at the faculty and department level, implementation of SEM will include ongoing alignment to the Strategic and Academic Plans; review of recruitment, retention and student success initiatives; continued improvements to data/information accessibility, collaboration and transparency, communication, engagement and partnership across the University; and ongoing process improvement with a focus on supporting enrolment goals.

An enrolment update will be provided during the Senate meeting.

New Faculty Orientation

One of our largest orientation for new members of faculty and teaching staff was held on August 29-30, 2017. New faculty on both campuses attended a series of excellent sessions. We would like to thank all who contributed to the delivery of the two days of sessions as well as TSC for all of their technical support. The newest edition of the Faculty Orientation handbook is now available on the University website under Faculty Resources.

An Orientation for all our contract lecturers is being organized for Thursday, September 21. The Orientation will take place in ATAC 5036 (Thunder Bay) and in OA 2005 (Orillia) from 1:30 – 4:30 pm and will be repeated from 5:00 – 8:00 pm.

Aboriginal Initiatives

Aboriginal Cultural & Support Services and Aboriginal Student Recruitment

Aboriginal Cultural and Support Services' Annual Fall Harvest was postponed to this Saturday, Sept 23 from 11:00 am-2:00 pm at the Sweat Lodge Site. Everyone is welcomed to attend. There will be cultural demonstrations by Elders and a dedication of the Medicine Garden the Office of Aboriginal Initiatives built this summer—a nice spot to go for a walk and contemplate life.

Faculty of Education

The Faculty of Education, working closely with members of Sandy Lake First Nation, will be offering a modified version of its Honours Bachelor of Education program to community members in Sandy Lake. The community has a strong commitment to education, and a long-standing relationship with the Faculty, and with Lakehead University. The program will be stretched out an additional year, with courses over the first few years offered online, as well



as by face-to-face instruction in Sandy Lake scheduled around the students' work schedules. Students will travel to Thunder Bay in the third and fourth spring or summers, to complete some coursework. For the final two years, students will move to Thunder Bay to complete our professional program, including their practicums.

Bora Laskin Faculty of Law

The Welcome to the Legal Profession Ceremony was held on August 31 at the Thunder Bay Courthouse. The 79 first-year students participated in the Bora Laskin Faculty of Law's annual ceremony. Justice Bonnie Warkentin, Superior Court of Justice and Justice Joyce Pelletier, Ontario Court of Justice presided. The students were also welcomed by Paul Schabas, treasurer with the law Society of Upper Canada; Rene Larson, president of the Thunder Bay Law Association; Ross Murray, vice-chairman of the Lakehead University Board of Governors; and Dean EagleWoman.

Faculty of Science and Environmental Studies

Ontario Master Naturalist Certificate program - Mr Bob Bowles, local award-winning naturalist, worked throughout the spring with local field naturalists and numerous Lakehead faculty and staff in this first-ever offering of this program in Thunder Bay. The certificate program was a week-long mix of classroom and field experiences held from July 10-16, 2017. This community program, in partnership with Ontario Nature, is now in its 3rd year on the Orillia Campus. "The Ontario Master Naturalist Program (OMNP) is a community program established by Lakehead University Orillia in partnership with Ontario Nature. The first of its kind in Canada, the OMNP provides naturalists and those interested in nature and environmental stewardship the opportunity to receive a Master Naturalist certificate." Plans are already in the works for Mr. Bowles to lead a second offering of this program in Thunder Bay in July 2018.

Superior Science and Aboriginal Mentorship Program Micro Maker Camps - As part of the Canada 150 celebrations, the Faculty's Superior Science team and Lakehead's Aboriginal Mentorship team worked with Actua, a national funder of science outreach programs, to deliver three days of programming to youth in grades 5 to 8 at the end of June using the Maker Mobile. Three one-day workshops were held at the Thunder Bay Indigenous Friendship Centre and at Lakehead University. The Maker Mobile is an interactive classroom on wheels and Thunder Bay was the mid-point of its 2017 journey between Victoria, BC and St. John's, NL. The Maker Mobile enhanced the Superior Science programming with special Innovation 150 Workshops designed to engage youth in meaningful and enriching experiences and to foster a nationwide culture of science and innovation. Youth designed and built with sophisticated maker tools including 3D printers, laser cutters, micro-controllers, and block programming while they solved real-world challenges. Credit to the successful hosting the Maker Mobile goes to the Superior Science co-Directors Nicholas Bel (4th year student in Applied Biomolecular Sciences) and Ashley Andrea (3rd year student in Chemical Engineering) and to Lisa Harris (AMP Coordinator) and Esther McKay (AMP Assistant Coordinator).



Science Week (July): First Nations Natural Resources Youth Employment Program - It was another successful summer (3rd) of the First Nations Natural Resources Youth Employment Program, in which Lakehead University partners with Outland Camps, Confederation College, various levels of government and Lac La Croix First Nation. Led by our AMP coordinator, Lisa Harris, Lakehead University and Confederation College delivered science week to First Nations youth from both the Mink Lake and Sandbar camps during the last week of July. Amongst other hands-on learning activities, youth were tasked with constructing a water filter that could address water concerns at various communities, given realistic constraints on resources presently faced by these communities. This activity was conceptualized by Dr. Amanda Diochon, Director of the Water Resource Sciences program and delivered by several senior undergraduate and graduate students from the Department of Geology. Let's Talk Science Sites (Thunder Bay and Orillia) - The Faculty of Science and Environmental Studies will add to its interest in science outreach to high school students in both Simcoe County and Thunder Bay district through the creation of Let's Talk Science (LTS) sites. LTS is "is an award-winning, national, non-profit, science outreach organization" that partners with post-secondary institutions to keep students engaged in science and to assist them in being the next generation of innovators and science-literate citizens and stewards for the 21st century. Each site at Lakehead's two campuses will have a faculty mentor which oversees a part-time student coordinator to deliver this outreach programming – Dr. Chris Murray in Orillia and Dr. Mike Rennie in Thunder Bay.

Anthropology Field School at Lac Seul First Nation (summer 2017) and 3D Printing of Artefacts for Educational Purposes - The Department of Anthropology continues to work with First Nations communities on experiential learning opportunities. Building upon the success of the field school held on the Thunder Bay campus in spring 2015, the Department offered a field school this past summer in partnership with Lac Seul First Nation. This field school aimed to train Lakehead students and Lac Seul high school students in methods of Archaeology and Sociocultural Anthropology, and involved contributions from several members of Lakehead Anthropology: Dr. Frederico Oliveira, Dr. Scott Hamilton, Dr. Martha Dowsley and Clarence Surette. The field school was viewed as highly successful by both Lakehead and by the Chief

and Council of Lac Seul FN and it is the intention that this field school would be offered every year. Library & Teaching Commons

Library

Course Resources

Processing of requests for course resources and course packages made through the <u>Course Resources Request Form</u> are well underway with 63 courses having items listed in D2L/Brightspace. Once material is submitted either for Course Reserves or a Course Package, library staff ensure that if copyright clearance is required, it is obtained.

Also, a reminder that <u>Copyright Information & Resources</u> on the Library's web site, includes a guide to fair dealing.

Website

A number of improvements have been made to the Library's website including:

- Top menu and footer are now synchronized.
- The main page search box now includes a link to <u>Topic Guides</u> (e.g. Copyright, Grammarly)
- The Top Five has been changed to Popular and we've added a sixth item "Printing Services" which links directly to the TSC help page for printing.
- Book a Research Consultation now goes straight to the calendar and links to librarians.
- Our social media feed now includes a more obvious link to our Events calendar.

Chancellor Paterson Library

A number of changes have been made to the Library over the summer including:

- Microforms (MF) are now located in the northeast corner of the 3rd floor. MF readers / printers are in Northern Studies Resource Centre and on the main floor.
- The tunnel accessibility entrance to the Library is now open. The door is unlocked during regular library hours.
- The student printers on the main floor have been moved out of the centre of the floor to a place closer to the entrance and within line of sight of the library services desk.

Technology

The Student computers in all libraries (Paterson, Orillia, Law, and Education) have been replaced which has greatly reduced login times. As well, wireless printing is now available in all of the libraries, which means that students can print directly from laptops, tablets, and phones. New students will get the new tap (RFID) student cards while returning students will have the option of replacing their existing cards with a new card for a fee (\$10). Using the new tap cards means students don't have to enter their IDs when they go to print.

Archives

Several more collections are now available for public access and research, including the Margaret Phillips fonds, two decades of the Lakehead University Library fonds, the United Steelworkers District 6 fonds, and the Thunder Bay Co-Operative Dairy fonds.



Teaching Commons

The renovations to the Teaching Commons on the 5th floor of the Paterson Library are scheduled to begin in October with a planned completion for the end of the Fall 2017 term.

Grammarly

The Writing Initiatives Committee, Library, and Teaching Commons are offering a one-year pilot of Grammarly Premium (http://libguides.lakeheadu.ca/grammarly on how to sign-up).

Grammarly can be used by students, staff and faculty to improve spelling, grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, and style in your writing. AWARE
