Gichi Kendaasiwin receives \$10M from Province

On May 7, the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development announced that it intends to invest \$10 million over three years for the development of our Gichi Kendaasiwan Centre.


The Centre is envisioned as a place of spiritual harmony, acting as a repository for documentation/artifacts, a meeting place for community and Indigenous leadership, and a student-centred home-away-from-home gathering place with Indigenous cultural events and supports. It will provide Indigenous students with an environment that is focused on student and community well-being that reflects Indigenous identity and culture. The Centre will also help boost educational outcomes and encourage economic growth in the area.

Through the Centre, we will support and promote traditional land use and occupancy research with cultural integrity at its core as well as research that promotes learning among Indigenous peoples around the world.

I would like to acknowledge and thank everyone whose invaluable work to conceive and develop this Centre, including members of our Indigenous communities, faculty, staff, community partners, Elders, and the the O-AGC.

With their ongoing support, I have spent my first months as Interim President advocating extensively to push this project over the finish line. Thanks to the Province's significant contribution, I look forward to continuing this effort to realize our collective dream.


The Teaching Commons is a dedicated space where faculty, instructors, and staff can come together to cultivate teaching excellence under the "Dream Big About Teaching". The Centre offers workshops, services, and supports, including, but not limited to, the following:

- Indigenous games and pastimes that connect to STEM concepts (bullroarer, buzzer, hand-string games, dice and stick games, whip and spin tops)
- Information and consultations on copyright issues, experiential learning, and Statistica
- Demonstrations of Lynda.com, Grammarly, Browzine, D2L, and Magna Mentor resources
- Online gamification tools such as StudyStack and Quizlet
- · Active-learning strategies, tools, and resources
- Virtual Reality (3D glasses with "Oculus Rift")
- A 3D printer

I would like to express my sincere thanks to the Provost's Task Force on Innovation and Excellence in Teaching, Learning and Technology who was charged with recommending institutional changes to organizational structure and infrastructure, and policy and resource requirements, to lay the groundwork for the development of an Advanced Teaching, Technology and Learning Centre. Two Mexican MOU's signed and International Panel Presentation

The Canada and Latin America Research & Exchange Opportunities (CALAREO) Consortium signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with The National Council of Science and Technology of Mexico (CONACyT) in Mexico City on May 24, 2018. The MOU will promote scholarly collaboration between Canada and Mexico in basic and applied sciences, including biotechnology, medicine, environmental and agricultural sciences, energy, and nanotechnology.

I represented the consortium, whose members include Memorial University of Newfoundland, Carleton University, École de Technologie Supérieure, University of Lethbridge, and Vancouver Island University.




Lakehead University and the Autonomous University of San Luis Potosi have been partners through our joint membership in the Inter-American Organization for Higher Education (IOHE) and have been discussing direct academic collaboration between our institutions for the past 2 years.

In November 2016, a delegation from Lakehead visited the Autonomous University of San Luis Potosi to further discuss collaboration and joint academic activities, as well as student and faculty mobility opportunities. Both institutions recognize the importance of the internationalization of higher education in providing new opportunities and expanding the vision and perspectives of students, staff and faculty.

As a result of these activities and the opportunities provided by Universities Canada and its Mexican counterpart, the National Association of Universities and Higher Education Institutions (ANUIES), and IOHE, the Autonomous University of San Luis Potosi and Lakehead University decided to formalize their relationship and signed an MoU with a focus on joint research, student and faculty mobility, short-term exchanges and dual degree opportunities.

Finally, I had the honour of presenting at, and participating in, an international panel entitled *Indigenizing higher education: How universities in Canada and Mexico are bringing Indigenous peoples, cultures and knowledge to campus.* Panelists shared their experiences and best practices for integrating Indigenous knowledge in research, education and governance. This provided me the opportunity to share what Lakehead University has done over the years regarding Indigenous relations and initiatives — a presentation that was very well received.
