Lakehead University Celebrates 16th annual (and first virtual) Research & Innovation Week

Lakehead University celebrated its 16th annual and 1st virtual Research & Innovation Week from March 1-5 in Thunder Bay and Orillia. Exploring the timely theme “Our Changing World”, Research & Innovation Week presented over 25 events, including keynote talks, student poster and oral competitions, faculty presentations, and panel discussions.

The opening ceremonies included virtual greetings from government representatives and special guests and a keynote talk by Bob McDonald, longtime host of CBC’s *Quirks and Quarks*, who provided an optimistic view of how we can survive the third millennium. The week also featured a series of sessions on the role of research and innovation in achieving the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

Throughout the week, the Ignite video series showcased four research projects that celebrate the ongoing research that is taking place on both our campuses. Over 2200 people viewed the videos on Twitter (@LakeheadRsrch) and Facebook (Lakehead University Research & Innovation).

A highlight of the week was the Research & Innovation Awards of Excellence virtual reception, which was held on March 4 to celebrate the exceptional achievements of professors, partners, and students. The 2021 Distinguished Researcher Awards, the highest honour conferred by Lakehead University for research and scholarly activity, were presented to:


IAP & Achievement Program Career & Undergraduate Exploration Day

On February 26, 2021, the Achievement Program partnered with Lakehead University's Indigenous Access Programs (IAP) to host a Career & Undergraduate Exploration Day for IAP students and Achievement Program students in grades 10-12. This event was the 8th annual Exploration Day for IAP, and the third year joining with the Achievement Program.

The Career & Undergraduate Exploration Day was designed to help students decide which undergraduate degree or career pathway they might wish to pursue. To begin our virtual event, we held an opening ceremony that included a smudging and song by Elder Beatrice Twance, words of welcome from Lakehead University's Chancellor and Achievement Program Guidance Committee Chair, Lyn McLeod and Vice-Provost, Indigenous Initiatives Denise Baxter, and a greeting from a Native Access Program alumnus who shared their educational journey and words of advice.

The opening welcome was then followed by a virtual Speed Networking Sessions for our students to connect with faculty, staff, current students, and professionals in the areas of their interest. Students participated in three 15-minute rounds of networking with Faculty of Business Administration, Faculty of Engineering, School of Nursing, School of Kinesiology, Indigenous Education, Indigenous Learning, Psychology, School of Social Work and student success orientation leaders (current student).

The structure of the event allowed students to connect with and learn from faculty, staff, current students, and professionals in breakout rooms in a relaxed and inviting atmosphere.

Academic Excellence

Lakehead Orillia researchers receiving COVID-19-related research grants

Two Lakehead University Orillia researchers are receiving Partnership Engage Grants of approximately \$25,000 each for research connected with COVID-19, from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada.

Dr. Natalya Timoshkina, Associate Professor in the School of Social Work, and two graduate students will partner with North Simcoe Victim Services for one year to examine the impact of COVID-19 on service provision to persons who have experienced human trafficking.

It involves the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons by means of threat, use of force, abduction, debt bondage, fraud, deception, the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability, or other forms of coercion for the ultimate purpose of exploitation, typically in the sex industry or for forced labour.

Dr. Olakunle Akingbola, Associate Professor in the Faculty of Business Administration, will partner with Caribbean African Canadian Social Services Inc. (CAFCAN) for one year to research COVID-19 and remote work in non-profit organizations, including employee well-being and community outcomes.



The partnership seeks to investigate the characteristics of remote work at CAFCAN during COVID-19 and understand how employees perceive the remote work that they experience.

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Silver medal for Outstanding Achievements in Patient Care by the JWC and WUWHS Awards

Congratulations to **Dr. Idevania Costa**, Assistant Professor in the School of Nursing, on being awarded the Silver medal for “Outstanding Achievements in Patient Care” by the Journal of Wound Care and World Union of Wound Healing Societies Awards on February 20.

This prestigious award event is considered “the World Wound Care Olympics”. This award is open to all those, around the globe, who have made an outstanding contribution to any area of wound care putting patient at the centre of their work.

Dr. Costa received this award in recognition of the significant contributions she has been making to improve patients’ wound care in clinical, education, and research settings in both Brazil and Canada.

In Brazil, she established wound care clinics that remain functioning and to which she continues contributing her unique clinical expertise.

In Canada she has been working tirelessly to enhance individuals’ engagement in self-management of chronic wounds and advance wound care practice and outcomes. She developed a [theory](#) that explains how individuals engage in everyday self-management of chronic, hard to heal, wounds and uncovered the [socio-economic](#) factors facilitating or limiting their engagement.

Dr. Costa’s program of research at Lakehead University has focused on addressing the social determinants of health affecting for vulnerable populations (e.g., older adults, Indigenous) living with chronic conditions such as diabetes and preventing its consequences (e.g., foot disease and limb amputation).

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Recent Grants Received by Lakehead University Researchers

Dr. Vicki Kristman, Department of Health Sciences, in partnership with the Nookiwin Tribal Council was awarded a CIHR Project Grant worth \$367,200 and titled Evaluating the Wiji app to improve Indigenous workplace mental health: a mixed-methods approach. The purpose of the project is to evaluate the effectiveness of the use of an e-mental health application known as Wiji in improving Indigenous workplace mental health.

Dr. Robert Stewart, Department of Geography and the Environment, was awarded \$163,000 in combined funding from Environment and Climate Change Canada and the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry for Stream Restoration and Wetland Rehabilitation at the Fine Papers Site. The purpose of the project is to support environmental remediation efforts through the undertaking of a feasibility study for stream restoration as well as wetland rehabilitation as part of the Fine Papers site in the Thunder Bay, Ontario area.

Dr. Mitchell Albert, Department of Chemistry, is co-applicant on a Ministry of Health / Ministry of Long-Term Care grant held by Dr. Grace Parraga, Robarts Research Institute, Western University: Lung Structure-Function in Survivors of Mild and Severe COVID-19 Infection: ¹²⁹Xe MRI and CT for Rapid Evaluations and Next-wave Healthcare Planning. Of the \$876,000 awarded to the project, Lakehead is to receive \$387,900. The objective of the project is to study what long-term lung damage COVID-19-recovered individuals may suffer from post-recovery.

Dr. Maryam Ebrahimi, CRC in Low-dimensional Nanomaterials, Department of Chemistry, Lakehead University, is co-lead of the following recently awarded CFI Innovation Fund project: Advanced Materials Ontario: Harnessing the power of multifunctional catalysts for new technologies, Dr. Tong Leung, Department of Chemistry, Waterloo. The CFI is providing \$2,667,473 towards the project. Dr. Ebrahimi's portion of the research involves the development of a Scanning Probe Facility at Lakehead in order to develop 2D low-dimensional organic quantum materials. Dr. Ebrahimi will receive \$900,000 in CFI funding to purchase a DJ - Scienta Omicron Low-temperature Scanning Probe Microscope.

Faculty of Education student's win at International Climate Change-Makers Challenge

BEd student **Michael Chen** competed in the International Climate Change-Makers Challenge, an online competition that brought together engineers, artists, coders, educators, politicians, business-people and others to present and discuss potential solutions to our planet's climate change challenges under four themes: environment, economic, socio-cultural, and information.

Chen's team presented and won in the finals of the socio-cultural category.

Big names set to launch Third Age Learning Lakehead in Thunder Bay

Canadian activist and author Maude Barlow, the *Toronto Star*'s Linda McQuaig, and Lakehead University professor Dr. Charles Levkoe are just a few of the speakers set to present during Third Age Learning Lakehead's (TALL) inaugural five-part series in Thunder Bay, starting March 24.

"Pivot(al): Possibilities for a Post-pandemic World" will discuss the Covid-19 pandemic and its continued impact on community, globalism, climate, politics, the economy and more.

Supported by the Thunder Bay Community Foundation, the goal of TALL Thunder Bay is to provide adults 55-plus with informed presentations from experts in their fields along with an opportunity to socialize.



Dr. Charles Levkoe, Canada Research Chair in Sustainable Food Systems, the Director of the Sustainable Food Systems Lab, and associate professor in the Department of Health Sciences at Lakehead University, will kick off the series with "Food for Thought: Towards More Equitable and Sustainable Systems for All" on March 24. Levkoe will delve into some of the prominent challenges facing our food systems, and share examples of initiatives that aim to ensure more equitable and sustainable food systems for all.

On March 31, award-winning playwright, journalist, novelist, and filmmaker Drew Hayden Taylor will explore connections between theatre, humour, First Nations philosophy, literature, and identity in "*Me Tomorrow: Going Native* and Indigenous Futurisms".

Dr. Max Haiven, Canada Research Chair in Culture, Media and Social Justice at Lakehead University, will speak to how we can imagine more fair, peaceful and abundant ways of living together as we face the urge to return to "normal" in his talk, "The Struggle for the Post-pandemic Imagination" on April 7.

Linda McQuaig, journalist, author, activist and contributing columnist for the *Toronto Star*, will speak to how the COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted a serious flaw in our quest for privatization of public services and enterprises in "Now More Than Ever: Time to End our Misguided Zeal for Privatization" on April 14.

Maude Barlow will close out the series on April 13 with her talk, "From COVID-19 Crisis to Post-pandemic Possibilities: Transitioning to a Better Future". Barlow will draw on a lifetime of activism to discuss key issues like trade and the water crisis, but she will also distinguish the important differences between false hope, reality, and a 'wise hope' that opens up the potential for positive change.

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Ontario Invests in Mineral Exploration and Mining Research at Lakehead University

The Ontario government has provided more than \$690,000 to help support research and development in mineral exploration and mining at Lakehead University. A total of \$2.1 million has been provided by the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation (NOHFC), NSERC, Impala Canada, and Lakehead University to establish a five-year Industrial Research Chair in Mineral Exploration.

Dr. Peter Hollings, Professor of Geology and the Director of the Centre of Excellence for Sustainable Mining & Exploration (CESME) will assume this prestigious position. This investment will also support the creation of nine new jobs in Thunder Bay, and could eventually lead to the discovery of new mineral resources in Northern Ontario.



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Professor Mohammad Nasir Uddin named Fellow of the IEEE



Dr. Mohammad Nasir Uddin has been elevated to the status of Fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) for his outstanding contributions to control techniques for alternating current (AC) motor drives. He is the first IEEE Fellow at Lakehead University. IEEE Fellow is the highest grade of membership and is recognized by the technical community as a prestigious honor and an important career achievement. The IEEE is the world's leading professional association for advancing technology for humanity. Through its 400,000 plus members in 160 countries, the association is a leading authority on a wide variety of areas ranging from aerospace systems, computers and telecommunications to biomedical engineering, electric power and consumer electronics.

Uddin joined Lakehead University in 2001. He is currently a Professor in the Department of Electrical Engineering. He also serves as Coordinator of the Electrical Engineering program with the Lakehead-Georgian Partnership, and is the Director of the Renewable Energy, Power Systems and Drive Research Lab located in Barrie, Ont.

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Dr. Yimin Yang selected for Vector Faculty Affiliate Program

Dr. Yimin Yang from the Department of Computer Science has recently been appointed as a Faculty Affiliate at the prestigious Vector Institute. The Institute was established in 2017 for creating a community of premier AI talents in machine learning and deep learning researchers. Dr. Yang's research in these areas has won him wide recognition from his peers and leading experts on AI.

His appointment provides yet another piece of evidence for his research excellence. The Vector Institute has been funded by the Government of Canada through the Canadian Institute for Advanced Research (CIFAR), the Government of Ontario through the Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade, and nearly 40 companies in the Canadian economy across a range of sectors.

Lakehead's MSc in Computer Science (AI Specialization) is one of the few Vector-recognized AI MSc programs in Ontario, and top students from this program have been receiving Vector Institute scholarships since 2018.



Indigenous Learning student appointed to Minister Patty Hajdu's Youth Advisory Council

The Department of Indigenous Learning congratulates **Hannah Caruana** on her appointment to the Youth Advisory Council.

The Youth Advisory Council provides a venue for youth in the Thunder Bay-Superior North riding to discuss topics including COVID-19, social issues and environmental issues.

Hannah was motivated to seek out a seat on the Council to "assist in the actions needed to combat crises within our communities that rely on a dire need of youth voices and participation for sustainable implementation."

Over the course of the year, Hannah will be meeting bi-weekly with Minister Hajdu and other government representatives and support the creation of a youth driven community action plan to address safety and social well-being in the riding.





First-year nursing student receives a scholarship from Medavie

Grace Dawson, a first-year Nursing student at Lakehead University, has received a \$5,000 scholarship from Medavie.

Medavie, through its Foundation, has awarded a total of \$50,000 in scholarships that will be distributed to 10 exceptional students across four provinces, to support recipients in their post-secondary studies and future careers in health care.

Since 2017, the charitable foundation has awarded these annual scholarships to Canadians, aged 17-29, who are enrolled in full or part-time studies at a Canadian post-secondary school, are pursuing a health-related program of study, and have overcome adversity related to mental health, either through lived experience or a family member.

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Jessica Allingham wins 2nd place in the Provincial 3MT Competition for 2020

Jessica Allingham, a PhD student in Chemistry at Lakehead University, won second place in the Provincial 3MT (Three Minute Thesis) Competition held virtually by the University of Windsor, for her thesis presentation, “Brightening up brain injuries,” under the supervision of Dr. Michael Campbell and Dr. Wely Floriano.

The 3MT is a communication exercise that provides an opportunity for graduate students to communicate their scholarly research and creativity in just three minutes. It challenges graduate students to present their research in an engaging format that can be understood by an audience with no background in the research area.

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Hospital establishes vaccination clinic at Lakehead Thunder Bay

The head of the Thunder Bay Regional Health Sciences Centre says the facility is setting up a vaccination centre at the Bora Laskin building at Lakehead University. Rhonda Crocker-Ellacott, president and CEO at the hospital, confirmed the move, saying it will allow the vaccination capacity to ramp up to about 500 – when they have ample supply of vaccines to hit that number.

“We’re anticipating mid next week to be shifting our vaccine operation from our Health Sciences Centre over to Lakehead University. The whole idea behind that is we’re tapped out at about 168 vaccinations a day at the Health Sciences Centre, whereas we can likely do upward of 500 vaccines a day at Lakehead University,” Crocker-Ellacott said on February 11th.

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Harold G. Fox Lecture Series welcomed Chair of the Civil Resolution Tribunal

On January 26, Lakehead University welcomed **Shannon Salter** as its Harold G. Fox Lecture Series guest. Salter, the Chair of British Columbia's Civil Resolution Tribunal and adjunct professor at the University of British Columbia's Allard School of Law, discussed the way COVID-19 forced courts around the world to move online and what this could mean for the justice system. She described the growing consensus that it's time to digitally transform the justice system and if this will actually increase access to justice.

The Civil Resolution Tribunal is Canada's first online tribunal resolving small claims, condominium disputes, and motor vehicle accident disputes.

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Local and Global Partnerships

Launch of Industry 4.0: Automation Accelerator Pilot Program

The Office of Research & Innovation, and faculty researchers from Electrical Engineering and Computer Science, based at the Orillia campus, have partnered with County of Simcoe, Georgian College, and the Cities of Barrie and Orillia, to develop and launch a new pilot program called Industry 4.0: Automation Acceleration. The program aims to respond to an industry-expressed desire to acquire knowledge and training that will support them in smart manufacturing and new technology (such as artificial intelligence, machine learning, and sensors). The pilot kicked off this month with almost 20 manufacturing companies and other local industry participants.

The program runs two mornings a week over three weeks from March 9 – 25. On March 16, Dr. Salimur Choudhury, Assistant Professor in Computer Science, delivered a presentation on artificial intelligence. On March 23, Dr. Waleed Ejaz, Assistant Professor in Electrical Engineering, delivered a presentation on sensors and the Industrial Internet of Things (IIOT). The program will include opportunities for companies to have one-on-one sessions with Lakehead University and Georgian College personnel to discuss potential project ideas.

Centre for Education and Lifelong Learning partners with Anishnabek Employment and Training Services

CELL is partnering with the Anishnabek Employment and Training Services to bring Humanities 101 to nine indigenous communities north of Thunder Bay. Participants from both Simcoe County and these communities began this program on March 1st.

Over 70 households gathered online for "Tea with the Dames," a discussion of the documentary film and of Mariposa Arts Theatre, and a celebration of the 100th birthday of one of Orillia's great dames, Sue Mulcahy. Sue was Lakehead Orillia's first Civitas Award recipient. A portion of the proceeds raised at this event went to the Lakehead Student Travel Abroad Bursary Program.

The Ontario Youth Naturalist Program is in full swing with partners from Parks Canada and the Simcoe County District School Board, and this programming will extend with a concentration on Turtle Conservation at Elmvale District Secondary School beginning in April.

The next Third Age Learning Lakehead (TALL) series began on March 24th. Pivot(al): Possibilities for a Post-pandemic world, was developed in consultation with seniors from Thunder Bay and with support from the Thunder Bay Community Foundation. The series will feature Lakehead University's Dr. Charles Levkoe and Dr. Max Haiven, as well as Drew Hayden Taylor, Linda McQuaig, and Maude Barlow.

Lakehead-Confederation-Canadore MOU will develop transfer opportunities for Indigenous students

The presidents from Lakehead University, Confederation College, and Canadore College signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) via Zoom on Friday, February 12 to encourage and facilitate educational opportunities for Indigenous transfer students.

The five-year MOU comes after these post-secondary institutions collaborated on several recent projects funded by the Ontario Council on Articulation and Transfer (ONCAT) exploring the enhancement of wrap-around supports for Indigenous transfer students. These are team-based supports that ensure the post-secondary institutions understand each student's strengths and provide a network of holistic support.



The schools will establish an internal and external working group. The external working group will consist of the Vice-Provost, Indigenous Initiatives, the Coordinator of Indigenous Student Services Centre, and the Coordinator of Indigenous Outreach and Recruitment at Lakehead University, who will meet with designate(s) from Canadore College and designate(s) from Confederation College to make progress on the principles of the MOU. 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Meeting with elected officials to discuss impact of travel restrictions on international students



On February 19, Dr. Moira McPherson, President and Vice Chancellor, Lakehead University met with Minister Hajdu to discuss the travel restrictions surrounding COVID-19 and their potential impact on Lakehead University's International students. They also discussed possible other changes including the study permit potentially needed for programs under 6 months in duration.

On February 12, Lakehead University submitted a pre-budget submission to Ontario Minister of Finance the Honourable Peter Bethlenfalvy. In this submission we highlighted about the unique role we play in our regions and the urgency of strategic infrastructure as we look to recovery.

On February 8, Dr. Moira McPherson, President and Vice Chancellor, Andrew P. Dean, Vice President, Research and Innovation and Richard Longtin, Government Relations, Director met with **MP Eric Melillo**, a proud alumnus, to discuss Lakehead University. They highlighted our research agenda, our Gichi Kendaasiwin building and the support we have received from FedNor.

International MOUs Signed with Chile, Bangladesh, and Colombia

The Office of the Vice-President, Research and Innovation has recently signed MOUs with partners in Chile, Bangladesh, and Colombia. Two of the MOUs with Chile and two in Bangladesh were initiated in support of Lakehead faculty members.

In December, the Canada and Latin America Research & Exchange Opportunities (CALAREO) consortium, of which Lakehead University is the host institution, signed an MOU with Colombia Challenge Your Knowledge (CCYK), a network of 31 public and private universities across Colombia, whose mission is to promote Colombia as an international destination for higher education and research excellence. CCYK members are accredited by the Colombian Ministry of Education as high-quality institutions. CALAREO is partnering with CCYK to develop opportunities for research collaboration and mobility programs for faculty and students. On February 12, CALAREO presented the research strengths of the member universities to the General Assembly of CCYK.



Lakehead joins *MapIt* Learning Collaborative to improve student transfer journeys

Lakehead University has been chosen to be part of the Ontario Council on Articulation and Transfer's (ONCAT) second *MapIt* Learning Collaborative with nine other colleges and universities.

The *MapIT* Project aims to examine the entire transfer process: the steps students take when transferring schools in Ontario and the 'behind-the-scenes' workflow steps post-secondary institutions (PSIs) take when receiving applications.

Participating PSIs connected through knowledge-sharing sessions and received a collated map of the transfer journey – from both staff and student perspectives – to reveal pain-points, bottlenecks, and other opportunities for improvement to administrative and communications activities.

After gathering feedback from the first cohort, ONCAT confirmed the next group of PSIs in December 2020: Lakehead University, Centennial College, La Cité Collégiale, Northern College of Applied Arts and Technology, Sault College, Sheridan College, Trent University, the University of Guelph, and the University of Windsor. HESA (Higher Education Strategy Consultants) will return as a consultant.



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CELL secures SSHRC grant

The Office of Community Engagement and Lifelong Learning (CELL) was successful in securing a SSHRC Connection grant (\$24,589) for "Truth and Reconciliation in our Community: Enabling Indigenous-led Dialogue". This initiative will begin in March and culminate in a fall lecture series and several community-led projects enacting Truth and Reconciliation later in 2021.

With the support of the Community Foundation of Orillia and Area, CELL will be starting a pilot project with three classes in the Simcoe County District School Board: The Ontario Youth Naturalist Program. This modular and stackable program enables youth in the Specialist High Skills Major (Environment) stream to work with Lakehead professors, CELL instructors, and Parks Canada partners for reach-ahead opportunities and ICE (Innovation, Creativity, and Entrepreneurship) projects. Students in this program are also eligible for a \$500 bursary to Lakehead University.



Honouring Sue Mulcahy's 100th Birthday

In partnership with the Orillia Museum of Art and History, Lakehead Orillia planned and participated in a birthday celebration in the form of a drive-by parade in front of the home of Orillia community icon Sue Mulcahy who turned 100 years young on March 14.

Mulcahy was elected to the Orillia City Council in 1963 and 1964 and the future of the community's youth was always on her mind. In 1965, she and some likeminded advocates formed the Simcoe College Foundation. They lobbied the provincial government with relentless determination for nearly three decades. Several times they came close to victory – but their dream eluded them.

Years later, Mulcahy learned that her hometown would finally get its longed-for school when Lakehead Orillia opened its doors in 2006. Since that time, Sue Mulcahy has been a stalwart supporter of Lakehead. In recognition of her incredible efforts, Lakehead Orillia awarded her with the University's first Orillia Civitas Award in 2008.
