Dr. Curthoys (instructor for the course) would teach both these courses (each of which have 2 sections) & one other 4th year elective, for the 2 yr transition period. • Two other courses she is responsible for (3410 and 4411 both Interpretation courses) could be covered internally by one of our staff who are certified interpreters.**
