Graduates of a 2-year diploma program in Law and Security Administration, Police Foundations, or Community and Justice Services at an Ontario college may be admitted to the HBASc Criminology Major College Pathways program. If they have a minimum "B" average, they are eligible to be credited with 6 FCE towards the HBASc (Criminology), reducing the remaining requirements to 14 FCEs (with an overall average of 70%), as outlined below. Meeting the minimum requirement does not guarantee admission to either the University or a specific program.

# Criminology Specialization

Criminology 2010 Youth Crime and Justice Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: An analysis of the types, prevalence, characteristics, repercussions, and changing nature of youth crime in Canada. Emphasis will be placed on the various strategies that have and continue to be developed to remedy youth crime. Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 2030 Gender and Crime Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: A discussion of the intersections of gender, crime, and the criminal justice system. Specific topics could include: gender correlates of crime and victimization, gendered violence, masculinity and crime, and gendered experiences within criminal justice processes.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 2050 Race, Ethnicity, and Crime Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: An exploration of the relationship between race, ethnicity, and crime. Particular focus is on the history of racism in the criminal justice system, the disproportionate representation of racial minorities at all stages of criminal justice procedures, theories to explain these discrepancies, and strategies to resolve issues of unequal treatment.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3150 Crimes of the Powerful

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: A critical analysis of crimes perpetrated by individuals in positions of power or institutional authority. Specific topics could include: state crime, political corruption, police misconduct, environmental crime, industrial carnage, corporate crime, crime in sport, organized crime, and hate crime.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3350 Forensic Psychology

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: An examination of the relationship between psychology, crime, and the legal system. Particular emphasis is placed on the role of the forensic psychologist in criminal justice

proceedings.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3370 Cybercrime

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: An introduction to the many different types of cybercrime and the strategies used by law enforcement agencies to deal with this type of crime.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3590 Crime and Punishment

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: An examination of the relationship between crime and punishment in a historical and contemporary context. Specific focus will be placed on the development of police forces, prisons, and alternative sentencing procedures.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3770 Criminology of Pop-Culture Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: A discussion of the representations of crime and law enforcement in the media and popular culture. The course explores the ways in which fictional and non-fictional representations of crime and policing shape and distort public attitudes, behaviours, and perceptions.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 4010 Environmental Criminology

Credit Weight: 0.5

Prerequisites: Sociology 2221 or permission of the

instructor

Description: Explores the development of the field of environmental criminology and critically examines ways in which criminological theories can be applied to environmental issues, disasters, and concerns.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 4030 Comparative Criminology

Credit Weight: 0.5

Prerequisite: Criminology 1010 or permission of

the instructor

Description: A comparison of numerous criminal justice systems throughout the world. Specific focus is placed on exploring how different criminal justice systems respond to common problems,

issues, and events. Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 4050 Controversies in the Courts

Credit Weight: 0.5

Prerequisites: Criminology 1010 or permission of

the instructor

Description: An examination of various contentious, moral, and ethical issues in the criminal justice system, both within Canada and internationally. Topics could include: capital punishment, marijuana decriminalization or legalization, criminalizing violence in sport, gun control, forced castration of sex offenders, racial profiling, Aboriginal self-determination, and/or penal abolition.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 4070 Trafficking

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: A critical exploration of the illicit trade of goods and services within Canada and across international borders. Topics could include: human trafficking, sex slavery, the illicit drug trade, organ trafficking, and/or the trafficking of illegal

weapons and ammunition. Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Inquiry 4032 Honours Research in Criminology

Credit Weight: 1.0

Prerequisites: Inquiry 4010

Description: A detailed investigation of a topic of criminological interest under the supervision of a

faculty member. Offering: 3-0; 3-0
