Description of the Proposed Calendar Change:

To establish a major in Criminology

Rationale of the Proposed Calendar Change(s):

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The establishment of a Major program in Criminology is consistent with the Lakehead University Strategic Plan and Orillia Campus Plan. Consistent with the 2010-2013 Lakehead Strategic Plan, the establishment of this program will contribute to the sustainability, comprehensiveness, and diversity of the university by meeting prospective student interests, providing increased opportunities for innovative, interdisciplinary course offerings, and promoting awareness of justice issues in diverse communities both locally and internationally. Consistent with the 2009-2013 Orillia Campus Plan, the establishment of this major will contribute to the comprehensiveness of the Orillia campus, provide attractive programming, meet the demands of prospective students, and help provide substantial growth to undergraduate student enrollment. Furthermore, an objective outlined in the Orillia Campus Plan was to establish a major in Criminology by Fall 2010 (p.4). A minor in Criminology has been approved following Senate review at Lakehead University and the courses within it will form the foundation for the major in Criminology. As the Orillia campus continues to grow, the importance of these programs will also increase.

The development of Criminology in Simcoe County is vital, with the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Headquarters and Provincial Police Academy located in the city of Orillia. The OPP are committed to ensuring that their officers receive a university education. Simcoe County is also home to three correctional facilities, including a minimum security prison, Beaver Creek Institution, that has expressed interest in developing a relationship with Lakehead University. Working with these institutions of criminal justice will also serve to strengthen the Criminology programming at Lakehead University in Orillia.

This proposal also includes a pathways program for students completing a 2 year College diploma, such that they only need to complete 14 FCEs of the HBASc Criminology program. See below.

Honours BAsC (Criminology Major) College Pathways Program

Graduates of a 2-year diploma program in Law and Security Administration, Police Foundations, or Community and Justice Services at an Ontario college may be admitted to the HBAsC Criminology Major College Pathways program. If they have a minimum "B" average, they are eligible to be credited with 6 FCE towards the HBAsC (Criminology), reducing the remaining requirements to 14 FCEs (with an overall average of 70%), as outlined below. Meeting the minimum requirement does not guarantee admission to either the University or a specific program.

Year 1:

- (a) Inquiry 1010 and 1030
- (b) Criminology 1010 and 1030
- (c) Psychology 1100
- (d) Sociology 1100
- (e) One FCE elective (Biology 1010 recommended)

Year 2:

- (a) One FCE chosen from Criminology 2010, 2030, 2050; Political Science 2311, 2313, 2617; Sociology 2221
- (b) One FCE chosen from Criminology 3010, 3030, 3050, 3070, 3590, 3150, 3350, 3370, 3770; Political Science 3314; Psychology 3001; Sociology 2301, 3811
- (c) Psychology 2101
- (d) Sociology 2911 and 3310
- (e) One FCE elective at second or third year level

Year 3:

- (a) One FCE chosen from Criminology 4010, 4030, 4050, 4070; Sociology 4250
- (b) Inquiry 4010 and 4032
- (c) Two FCE Electives at third or fourth year level

Criminology Specialization

- (c) Two FCEs chosen from Criminology 3010, 3030, 3050, 3070, 3150, 3350, 3370, 3590, 3770, 4010, 4030, 4050, 4070; Political Science 2617, 3314; Psychology 3001; Sociology 3811, 4250

Criminology 2010 Youth Crime and Justice
Credit Weight: 0.5
Description: An analysis of the types, prevalence, characteristics, repercussions, and changing nature of youth crime in Canada. Emphasis will be placed on the various strategies that have and continue to be developed to remedy youth crime.
Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 2030 Gender and Crime
Credit Weight: 0.5
Description: A discussion of the intersections of gender, crime, and the criminal justice system. Specific topics could include: gender correlates of crime and victimization, gendered violence, masculinity and crime, and gendered experiences within criminal justice processes.
Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 2050 Race, Ethnicity, and Crime
Credit Weight: 0.5
Description: An exploration of the relationship between race, ethnicity, and crime. Particular focus is on the history of racism in the criminal justice system, the disproportionate representation of racial minorities at all stages of criminal justice procedures, theories to explain these discrepancies, and strategies to resolve issues of unequal treatment.
Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3150 Crimes of the Powerful
Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: A critical analysis of crimes perpetrated by individuals in positions of power or institutional authority. Specific topics could include: state crime, political corruption, police misconduct, environmental crime, industrial carnage, corporate crime, crime in sport, organized crime, and hate crime.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3350 Forensic Psychology

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: An examination of the relationship between psychology, crime, and the legal system. Particular emphasis is placed on the role of the forensic psychologist in criminal justice proceedings.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3370 Cybercrime

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: An introduction to the many different types of cybercrime and the strategies used by law enforcement agencies to deal with this type of crime.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3590 Crime and Punishment

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: An examination of the relationship between crime and punishment in a historical and contemporary context. Specific focus will be placed on the development of police forces, prisons, and alternative sentencing procedures.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 3770 Criminology of Pop-Culture

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: A discussion of the representations of crime and law enforcement in the media and popular culture. The course explores the ways in which fictional and non-fictional representations of crime and policing shape and distort public attitudes, behaviours, and perceptions.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 4010 Environmental Criminology

Credit Weight: 0.5

Prerequisites: Sociology 2221 or permission of the instructor

Description: Explores the development of the field of environmental criminology and critically examines ways in which criminological theories can be applied to environmental issues, disasters, and concerns.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 4030 Comparative Criminology

Credit Weight: 0.5

Prerequisite: Criminology 1010 or permission of the instructor

Description: A comparison of numerous criminal justice systems throughout the world. Specific focus is placed on exploring how different criminal justice systems respond to common problems, issues, and events.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 4050 Controversies in the Courts

Credit Weight: 0.5

Prerequisites: Criminology 1010 or permission of the instructor

Description: An examination of various contentious, moral, and ethical issues in the criminal justice system, both within Canada and internationally. Topics could include: capital punishment, marijuana decriminalization or legalization, criminalizing violence in sport, gun control, forced castration of sex offenders, racial profiling, Aboriginal self-determination, and/or penal abolition.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Criminology 4070 Trafficking

Credit Weight: 0.5

Description: A critical exploration of the illicit trade of goods and services within Canada and across international borders. Topics could include: human trafficking, sex slavery, the illicit drug trade, organ trafficking, and/or the trafficking of illegal weapons and ammunition.

Offering: 3-0; or 3-0

Inquiry 4032 Honours Research in Criminology

Credit Weight: 1.0

Prerequisites: Inquiry 4010

Description: A detailed investigation of a topic of criminological interest under the supervision of a faculty member.

Offering: 3-0; 3-0

Note: May only be taken by Criminology Majors

Biology, English, Geography, or Environmental Sustainability, with electives providing interdisciplinary perspectives and well-rounded arts and science coverage.

Alternatively, students may choose a major in Anthropology, Criminology, English, Environmental Sustainability, Geography, or Media Studies, with electives providing interdisciplinary perspectives and well-rounded arts and science coverage.

6. Students in the HBASc Criminology Major are required to satisfactorily complete 20 FCEs, including 10 FCEs of required courses in Criminology and other specified courses, and 2 FCEs of Inquiry. A total of 8 FCEs (see Regulations 9 and 10) of elective courses may be chosen from within or outside of the Department (see Recommended List of Electives). Up to two FCEs of these electives may be taken from any faculty.
