# Report on Academic Colleagues' Meeting

### COU Office, Toronto, February 13, 2009

### 1) Executive Committee Update

- a) John Ronson of Courtyard Group hired by the Ontario Government to develop a long-term approach to investing in university infrastructure is preparing his report after visiting all the university campuses. A technical advisory group (university) has been discussing the government approach in developing long-term capital plan considering 1) demand and enrolment growth projection, 2) labour market information, 3) educational trend, 4) current infrastructure, 5) capital financing and 6) space management.
- b) Applications received this year from secondary school students were increased by 1.1% (84,300 students) and that from non-secondary school students by 9.9% (21,188) over 2008.
- c) Accommodating accessibility for disabled persons will result 10-15% increases in cost for new buildings and renovation of old buildings.
- d) Universities are anxious to know from the MTCU about the graduate students' allocation for expansion and system design.
- e) MTCU is very interested in discussing the draft paper on greater articulation with colleges (Alister Sommer, Chair)

## 2) Budget and Audit Subcommittee Report

- i) Application centre is on budget. Others are in a deficit.
- ii) OCGS deficit is \$300K; increased fees for member organizations is being considered
- iii) IUTS (interlibrary loans) deficit is \$500K
- iv) COU deficit is running about \$423K deficit.

Based salary freeze for COU staff, plus other cost cutting measures implemented. COU is putting bid for a new accountant. Implemented enhanced monitoring and enforcement rules.

#### 3) Quality Assurance Task Force

- a) Significant changes are underway for quality assurance at the graduate and undergraduate levels. Oversight of the graduate quality assurance is transitioning to the OCAV from the OCGS.
- b) New guidelines for graduate and undergraduate quality assurance are being prepared.
- c) A separate body called Ontario Universities' Council on Quality Assurance (OUCQA) will be established to ensure academic quality and accountability in Ontario universities.

- d) Taskforce on Quality Assurance hopes to release its report by March 2009.
- 4. <u>Colleague's Paper on Ontario Transfer Credit System</u> (Philippe Constanlineau, RMC)

Second draft of this paper was discussed. The following are the highlights:

- a) Existing credit transfer system is arbitrary and unsatisfactory. It rarely involves academic departments and often done in most institutions by one office staff.
- b) Block transfer of credit without specific names of the courses in the transcript makes it impossible to assess the qualification.
- c) British Columbia and Alberta have names of credit transfer courses in the transcript and maintain a database. Ontario does not mention course names nor it maintains a data base.
- d) Credit transfer is made based on subjective consideration such number of as hours of instruction not quality of instruction or instructor's qualification.
- 5. <u>COU Update</u> (Paul Genest, President, COU)
  - a) Deferred maintenance remains a serious challenge for the university. Quick start project with new construction is attractive to stimulus package funding.
  - b) System wide deficit in Ontario universities is \$510M. Responsible Ministers are made aware of this.
  - c) Ontario Premier considers universities as key vehicle for infrastructure spending. He recognizes the need for training more graduate students. Ontario tuition fees are lower than the United States.
  - d) Increased growth in GTA but one-third of the GTA students apply outside GTA.
  - e) Opportunities for growth in Aboriginal higher education.
  - f) Economic meltdown is jeopardizing university sustainability. Meeting pension obligation has been difficult. Ontario universities are faced with \$560M pension deficit. Universities are seeking relief on or exemption of solvency obligation.
  - g) There is a working group seeking long-term solution to this very pressing issue. Increase in tuition fees being considered as part of the solution.
