Glenda Bonifacio is a professor of Women and Gender Studies at the University of Lethbridge. She also teaches courses in the Asian Studies Program and is a member of its Advisory Committee. Glenda has served a full term as chair of the department, an elected member of the General Faculties Council, a member of the Executive Council of the Faculty of Arts and Science, and an elected member of the Gender, Equity and Diversity Committee of the faculty association. She also served as a racialized member of the Equity Committee of the Canadian Association of University Teachers (CAUT). In 2016, Glenda co-founded the Support Network for Academics of Colour Plus (SNAC+) composed of diverse students, staff, faculty, and community members to promote equity, racial justice, and inclusion on campus and beyond. Glenda is an Honorary Research Fellow of the Network for Education and Research on Peace and Sustainability (NERPS) hosted by Hiroshima University and the recipient of the 2022 international research fellowship from the Japan Society for the Promotion of Science (JSPS).

Glenda Bonifacio is the author of *Pinay on the Prairies* (UBC Press 2013); editor of 4 books on global youth migration (Bristol University Press [BUP] 2019), gender and feminisms (Emerald Press 2018), gender and rural migration (Routledge 2014), and feminism and migration (Springer 2012); and co-editor of disasters in the Philippines (BUP 2023), racism in southern Alberta (Athabasca University Press 2023), women and religion (BUP 2018), immigration in small cities (Springer 2017), domestic workers and family life (Palgrave Macmillan 2015), and gender religion, migration (Lexington Books 2010). In the community, Glenda co-founded ReadWorld Foundation to support schools impacted by disasters to rebuild library resources in the Philippines since 2014. In 2019, Glenda established the Canada-Asia Pacific Island Countries (CAPIC) Network to examine the intersections of gender, disaster, and migration with local scholars and the inclusion of Indigenous ways of knowing in the protection of the environment. As a community-engaged scholar working in local and global contexts, Glenda was included in the Global 100 Most Influential Filipino Women in the World by the Filipino Women's Network (FWN) USA in 2015, and the recipient of the 2021 presidential award from the Commission of Filipinos Overseas.
