## CRIMINOLOGY

### ***Offered at the Orillia Campus***

Criminology at Lakehead University in Orillia is offered within the Honours Bachelor of Arts and Science degree, which allows you to explore your diverse interests in arts *as well as* science-related subjects. This degree is designed to encourage you to think beyond the isolated disciplinary structures, trains you in multidisciplinary critical thinking skills and problem-solving strategies, and prepares you for a rich variety of post-graduate possibilities.

### **Honours Bachelor of Arts and Science (HBASc)**

#### *Criminology Major*

The study of Criminology concerns the social and legal aspects of crime and justice and involves studies from Sociology, Psychology, and Political Science. At Lakehead University you will develop skills in social justice and human rights, law and legal institutions, and criminalistics, as well as technology and psychology. You will take courses in a wide range of areas including issues of social, restorative, community, and Indigenous justice.

As a graduate of this program, you will be better prepared to work within and critically evaluate a changing justice system in Canada that no longer places policing and the courts at its centre, and is increasingly mediated by science and technology.

### **Admission Requirements**

Graduates of diploma programs relating to Criminology (e.g. Police Foundations; Protection, Security & Investigation; Law & Security Administration; Community & Justice Services; etc.), with a minimum overall "B" (70% or 3.0 GPA) average, may be eligible for transfer credit towards the first year of the HBASc program. Students will be considered on an individual basis upon receipt of official academic transcripts.

### **Careers**

The Criminology program at Lakehead University Orillia prepares you for professions in a variety of fields in law and justice systems, and specific professions such as: police officer, private investigator, forensic scientist and psychologist, security, correctional officer, youth worker, and court clerk. You could also continue your education by pursuing graduate studies or professional programs such as law school.
