

Intermediate - Senior (Grades 7 - 12) Teaching Subject Submission Form

The Bachelor of Education Intermediate/Senior program requires applicants to come prepared with a knowledge background in their chosen teaching subjects. Use the below form to identify your undergraduate level courses that correspond to your chosen teaching subjects. Review each teachable requirement below before completing the form.

Identify Five (5) full year courses, or the equivalent, in the first teaching subject.	Identify Three (3) full year courses, or the equivalent, in the second teaching subject.
	Note: A minimum of one half-course (0.5FCE) must be at the <u>third or fourth-year level for both</u> first and second teachable choices.

Reminders:

- A course must receive a passing grade to count towards a teaching subject.
- Full year courses count as 1.0 FCE

- If you have taken a course that is cross-listed under two different disciplines, you can use it to satisfy the requirements for **either** of your two teachable subjects.
 - Example: If you took a Biology course that is also cross-listed as Chemistry, you can allocate those credits to either your Biology teachable or your Chemistry teachable.
 - A single course cannot be double-counted to satisfy both teachable requirements simultaneously.
- College level courses are not usable towards teachable requirements.

Teaching Subject Prerequisites

English, History or Geography (TBAY and Orillia): Applicants must present core courses from the subject area. One (1) full year course, or the equivalent, in Political Science can be used towards the History teaching subject.

Environmental Science (TBAY and Orillia): Applicants must present a minimum number of full year course equivalents for either a first or second teaching subject from at least three (3) of the following disciplines: Anthropology (Science courses only), Astronomy, Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Studies (Science courses only), Geography (Science courses only), Geology (Earth Sciences), Meteorology, Outdoor Recreation or Physics.

First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Studies (TBAY): Applicants must present a minimum number of full year course equivalents from any of the following subject areas: Indigenous Learning, Native Studies, and Canadian Studies.

French as Second Language (TBAY): Applicants must present five (5) full year course equivalents, or the equivalent, in core French, in order to qualify for the French as a Second Language teaching subject. This applies to both the first and second teaching subject.

Health & Physical Education (TBAY): A recognized undergraduate degree in Kinesiology or Physical Education is required for the first teaching subject. Activity courses do not count toward the number of required courses for the Health & Physical Education teaching subject. Only one (1) full year course, or the equivalent, in Anatomy and/or Physiology will count toward the Health & Physical Education teaching subject. Students applying to Health & Physical Education as a second teaching subject are not required to have one half year course, or the equivalent, at the senior level.

Mathematics (TBAY and Orillia): Applicants must present core Mathematics courses.

Music (Vocal and Instrumental) (TBAY): A recognized undergraduate degree (i.e. HBMus) in Music is required. This applies to both the first and second teaching subject. Lakehead University does not offer Music-Instrumental and Music-Vocal in combination as teaching subjects. Students are required to teach music in a "band" setting conducting students playing a variety of instruments (i.e. guitar, violin, brass ensemble, etc) and should have a variety of courses in different instruments. A background in conducting and/or ensemble courses is required.

Native Language (TBAY): Applicants must present five (5) full year course equivalents, or the equivalent, in the same language, in order to qualify for the Native Language teaching subject. This applies to both the first and second teaching subject.

Biology (TBAY and Orillia): Applicants must present a minimum number of full year course equivalents for either a first or second teaching subject, as well as a combination of both plant and animal (invertebrate and vertebrate) Biology. Only 1.5 full year courses, or the equivalent, from the following list, will be counted towards the Biology teaching subject: Biochemistry, Human Anatomy & Physiology, Histology, or Immunology. All other courses must be core Biology courses.

Chemistry (TBAY and Orillia): Applicants must present core Chemistry courses. Only one (1) full credit in Biochemistry and only one (1) full credit in Pharmacy courses can be counted if relevant.

Science-General (TBAY and Orillia): Applicants must present a minimum number of full year course equivalents from any combination of the following subject areas: Anthropology (Science courses only), Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Studies (Science courses only), Geography (Science courses only), Geology (Earth Sciences), Astronomy, Meteorology, and Physics. At least three (3) of these subject areas must be represented.

Physics (TBAY): Applicants must present core Physics courses. Courses (if relevant) in the following areas may be considered: Fluids, Mechanics of Materials, Heat Transfer, Thermodynamics, Dynamics, Statics, and Electrical/Electronic Technology.

Social Sciences (Second teachable only) (TBAY and Orillia): Applicants must present the equivalent of 3.0 full-year courses from any combination of at least three (3) of the following: Anthropology, Religious Studies, Psychology, Philosophy, Sociology, or Women's Studies.

Visual Arts (TBAY): A recognized undergraduate degree in Visual Arts is required for both the first and second teaching subject. A maximum of one (1) full year course, or the equivalent, in Art History will count towards the Visual Arts teaching subject. The majority of courses presented must be studio courses.
