Course Outline

Walking the fine line between science and fiction, guided by anthropology, we will examine interpretations of artifacts and archaeological structures as depictions of ancient "out of this world" technological intelligence. We will discuss contradicting hypothesis and positions and examine variety of anthropological and scientific sources build and collected during the last ten thousand years. We will search for an answer to the ultimate question about the origins of life and civilization on our planet. Our goal in this course is to consider many possibilities, keeping an open mind. We will use a perspective informed by anthropology and consider the alien depictions in relation to the belief systems of different cultures, societies and individual tribes. As a background we will spend some time on the basic concepts, history and branches of anthropology as well as on the different types of scientific inquiry and technology developments.
