ANTH 3312 Medical Anthropology: Illness and Healing in Cultural Perspective

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Course Description: Medical Anthropology explores conceptualizations of the body, illness and healing from a cross-cultural lens. This course will examine alternatives to the western biomedical model in terms of traditional healing and holistic interpretations of the body. In addition, the course will focus on Medical Anthropology as an engaged field of work by situating it within the political economy of global health and power/capitalist relations.

Course Requirements:

- 1. Several questions will be posted each week under Content on D2L related to the course readings. You are expected to submit by email (mvanden1@lakeheadu.ca) a weekly reading response (half a page) incorporating thoughts regarding the readings, video lecture, related video clips and questions posted. Further questions, thoughts, or clarifications related to the weekly Zoom discussion sessions can also be included if applicable. The weekly Zoom discussion is not a requirement but it is available if students wish to engage further with the material or have any questions. The **Zoom meeting will occur every Tuesday from 10-11am with the first meeting being on Tuesday, Jan 5th.** Each response is worth 5% for a total of 60% of your final grade. A grade of 0% will be given if the response is not submitted by midnight Friday unless prior arrangements or documentation is provided.
- 2. 7-10-page term paper based on topic of choice related to medical anthropology. Three outside references are required at minimum and AAA (American Anthropological Association Style) must be used. Double-spaced 12-point Times New Roman font. Term paper will be worth 40% of final grade.
