ANTH 4811 WAO - Winter 2021 Love, Sex and Economics: Economies of Affect

Course Description:

This course will explore the intersections of love, sex and global capitalism. By utilizing the concept of "economies of affect" we will examine love and sex as directly enmeshed within neoliberal politics and state regimes. An analysis of the "intimate" in relation to political economy enables a deeper understanding of love, sex, and the search for human connection within a neoliberal era of precarity. The course will examine the shifting relationships between human subjectivities and the state, market, and society.

Course Requirements:

- 1. Attendance and participation in Zoom class discussions. Students are expected to attend lectures and to have readings completed by the assigned dates so they will be able to actively participate. Students will be required to have a Reading Journal where they will write down thoughts related to the weekly articles, and responses to class discussions and lectures. The **Reading Journals** will be due on **Feb 11** and **April 13** emailed to mvanden1@lakeheadu.ca by **midnight** and worth **20% each** for a total of 40% of overall grade.
- 2. A take-home essay based on the graphic novel Gringo Love will be due at midnight on March 4 and worth 25% of overall grade.
- 3. A **one-page term paper proposal** outlining concepts and references to be used. This will be worth **5%** of final grade and due at **midnight on March 11**. Please include references in AAA style.
- 4. **8-12 page term paper** based on topic of choice related to the concepts of love, sex and neoliberalism and pre-arranged through paper proposal. Three course references and two outside references are required at minimum. Term paper will be worth **35%** of final grade and due at **midnight on April 15**.
