

Critical Reflection Forum Posts – You will be expected to read or explore an assigned material – an article, a poster, an image, a song, a news article and then provide your opinion/thoughts/reflections on it. There are no 'right' answers – you are encouraged to express your perspective. You will do four (4) of these. In addition you will comment on the posting of one of your peers in a substantive (no simply agreeing or repeating) and collegial manner. These can be answers to their posted questions or further reflections on the readings.

Critical Reading Forum Posts – You will be expected to read an article (one assigned on a weekly checklist and provide at least 2 questions on the main points of the reading. These should be more comprehensive deeper questions than definitions or descriptions. An example will be provided in week 1.
