Expanded Course Description: The purpose of this course is to explore the concept of altruism. Altruism has been defined as a belief in or practice of selfless concern for the welfare of others. The particular ways in which altruism has been understood varies dependent upon the theoretical paradigm. The course is divided into 4 sections where we will consider altruism from a philosophical perspective, in terms of economic anthropology and bioethics, within spirituality, and from an evolutionary psychological paradigm.

Please make sure you proofread since marks will be deducted for typos etc. Also ensure you reference properly. A minimum of 3 academic sources are required. **Term Paper will be due on D2L by 11:59pm Feb 13**. There will be a 5% deduction per day late until 7 days at which point the term paper will be worth 0%.
