Expanded Course Description: This course will explore the history and current understandings of goddess worship across various societies. Concepts such as the divine feminine will be explored in both historical contexts (Sumerian, Minoan, Indian, Egyptian), but also in current goddess movements (Wicca and Neo-Paganism) and goddess-worshiping traditions (Aboriginal Australia, Indigenous North America, Celtic and African goddess traditions). This cross-cultural exploration will also investigate understandings of matriarchy and whether there is a connection between goddess worshipping societies and the position of women in social/legal context.

Details of Assignments

Reading Journals: The journals are an opportunity to express your thoughts/responses/critical reviews of bi-weekly readings and lectures. Please present your reasoning in a critical/informed way. You should also comment on class discussions and films.

Lecture: Select the day you would like to present. Prepare a slideshow, lecture information and any potential films or extra resources. Everyone in the class is responsible for doing the readings each week in advance and actively participating in the discussion. Your presentation will need to include at least **three** outside academic references that you will list on the last slide in addition to listing your sources on each slide as you would for an in-text citation in a term paper. Of these three sources, please select one to submit on D2L for the class to read at least one week before you present.

Collaboration/Plagiarism Rules
