This monthly activity report is sent to members of the Northern Ontario School of Medicine's (NOSM) Board of Directors, Academic Council, Aboriginal Reference Group, and Francophone Reference Group. This report is based on key messages sent to NOSM staff and faculty throughout the month from the office of the Dean.

Northern Constellations 2016

Northern Constellations Faculty Development Conference is NOSM's pre-eminent annual intensive faculty development activity. Faculty members from all Divisions and all parts of Northern Ontario participate in two days of interactive workshops organized into three streams: education, research, and leadership. Each year the number of participants has grown with over 250 in 2015. For 2016, we have three outstanding world leaders in medical education as guest speakers: Dr. Brian Hodges on A Call to Caring: Balancing Compassion and Technical Expertise; Dr. David Irby on Extraordinary Clinical Teaching on the Run; and Dr. Josh Tepper on Supporting Clinical Teaching Through Adaptive Learning. Save the date now for April 8-9, 2016.

A key feature of Northern Constellations is the workshops and other interactive sessions led by NOSM faculty members. Now is the time to submit your proposal for a workshop at Northern Constellations 2016. Submissions covering topics which will further develop NOSM faculty for their varied roles and responsibilities are welcome. Priority topics include: preceptor/learner wellness, leadership development, learner assessment, competency-based medical education, simulation, mentorship, and faculty research collaborations. Longitudinal Integrated Clerkships

NOSM was the first medical school in the world in which all students undertake a longitudinal integrated clerkship (LIC), the Comprehensive Community Clerkship (CCC). Based in family practice, the CCC is the third year of the MD program. Rather than a series of clerkship block rotations, students meet patients in family practice such that "the curriculum walks through the door." Students follow these patients and their families, including when cared for by other specialists, so as to experience continuity of care. During the year, students achieve learning objectives which cover the same six core clinical disciplines as in the traditional clerkship blocks. Students live in one of 15 large rural or small urban communities, excluding Sudbury and Thunder Bay. Consequently, NOSM students learn their core clinical medicine from the family practice, community perspective, while also gaining exposure to community based specialist care.

A growing number of medical schools offer some form of LIC as a parallel stream to the standard teaching hospital block clerkships. Prior to the first CCC, NOSM hosted a workshop in August 2006 which brought together six medical schools to share their experiences of LICs. The following year (2007), the Consortium of Longitudinal Integrated Clerkships (CLIC) was formed in Boston, hosted by the Cambridge Integrated Clerkship (CIC) of Harvard Medical School. Since then, there has been at least one CLIC conference each year. On October 4-8, Duke University, Durham and the University of North Carolina, Asheville hosted CLIC 2015. Attended by 250 participants from 60 schools worldwide, this year's CLIC program featured plenary presentations and multiple parallel sessions which explored a diverse range of topics related to LICs. Save the date now for CLIC 2016 in Toronto on October 16-18, 2016.

Education and Scholarship Awards

NOSM's phenomenal achievements in a relatively short time are the result of the outstanding contributions by many, many people. The School as whole has been recognized through various awards and individuals have received recognition from outside organizations. However, recognition internally from our peers and colleagues stands out as particularly special. The NOSM Awards of Education and Scholarship program highlights exemplary efforts of faculty members and learners in the pursuit of the School's vision of Innovative Education and Research for a Healthier North.

Awards are open to faculty members from all three divisions in the following categories: Clinical Scholar; Medical Educator; Clinical Teacher; Academic Leader; and, Scholar. Learner-nominated categories are: Teacher; Peer Teaching; Scholarly Activity; and, Advocate/Leader. Award nominations recently closed. Award recipients will be acknowledged publicly at Northern Constellations faculty development conference April 8-9, 2016.

Action to Achieve our Goals

On September 23, we held the public launch of Reaching Beyond Extraordinary Together: Strategic Plan 2015-2020, developed in collaboration with the people and communities of Northern Ontario. The new NOSM Strategic Plan (www.nosmsp2020.ca) confirms the School's vision, mission and values, as well as setting five strategic goals to be achieved over the next five years: 1. Enrich our educational programs to foster exemplary quality health care in rural and remote communities; 2. Strengthen our capacity to perform outstanding research that aligns with the health needs of Northern Ontario; 3. Create an inclusive whole school culture and learning environment that support the growth and development of our faculty, staff, and learners; 4. Empower our faculty members through ongoing engagement and active involvement in all aspects of the School; and, 5. Engage our communities, health service partners, and other collaborators strategically to strengthen relationships and expand resources.

These high-level goals set the direction for NOSM and constitute a challenge for us all. In late October, the Senior Leadership Group (SLG) reviewed the Integrated Action Plan Work which sets out the following five major school-wide activities: Connecting the Wider NOSM Campus; Sustaining and Aligning NOSM's Infrastructure, Logistics and Leadership; Growing our Culture of Continuous Improvement at NOSM; Expanding Research in the North for the North; and, Leadership and Influence Beyond NOSM. The success of these activities and achievement of our goals will depend on what we do and how we work together over the next five years. I look forward to your active participation.

NOSM Board Holds Face-to-Face Meeting in Thunder Bay

Board Members Tour Anishnawbe Mushkiki Aboriginal Health Centre and Take Part in a Case-Based Learning Exercise

The <u>Board of Directors of the Northern Ontario School of Medicine</u> (NOSM) held a face-to-face meeting in Thunder Bay on November 26 and 27, 2015.

NOSM Board members began their two-day meeting with a tour of the <u>Anishnawbe Mushkiki</u> <u>Aboriginal Health Centre</u>. Established as a primary health care facility within the District of Thunder Bay, the Centre provides primary, traditional, and alternative approaches that work to empower Aboriginal people to achieve optimal health and wellbeing.

This year, NOSM's Board of Directors and Academic Council members participated together in quality monitoring and effectiveness sessions, first looking at the Institutional Quality Assurance Process (IQAP), led by Dr. Moira McPherson, Chair of NOSM's Board of Directors and Lakehead's Provost and VP (Academic), and Dr. Nancy Luckai, Lakehead's Deputy Provost. Next, Directors took part in two Case-Based Learning (CBL) exercises typical of NOSM's student-centred teaching approach. This session was led by Dr. Roger Strasser, NOSM's Dean, Dr. David Marsh, NOSM's Deputy Dean and Associate Dean of Community Engagement, Dr. Owen Prowse, NOSM's Assistant Dean of Admissions, Miriam Cain, NOSM's Director of Admissions, and Kate Beatty, NOSM's Director of Equity and Quality.

In the evening of the first day, Board members were able to view <u>The Rural Challenge and the</u> <u>Northern Ontario School of Medicine</u>, a documentary by Dr. Hoi Cheu, a faculty member and researcher at Laurentian University. The film describes NOSM's revolutionary rural educational model through the personal experience, insight and humour of the School's students, graduates, faculty members, community partners, and international associates.

Throughout the two days, Board members received presentations related to NOSM's socially accountable admissions processes, finance, and advancement, and updates from several Board committees. In addition, Board members heard about the progress made regarding NOSM's development of a *Response to and Prevention of Sexual Violence on Campus* strategy.

Angèle Brunelle, NOSM Board member, and Executive Director of L'Accueil francophone, and NOSM's Dr. David Marsh, provided an overview of the recently held fifth Francophone Symposium where more than 90 health professionals and community partners from across Northern Ontario gathered to explore dimension of health care related to Francophone populations.

At the formal Board meeting at the end of the second day, the Board approved Financial Statements from the Finance, Audit and Risk Committee for the five-month period ending September 30, 2015.

The Board-approved <u>A Roadmap to 2020: NOSM's Whole School Strategic Action Plan was</u> <u>circulated to all members</u>, which is a follow-up document to NOSM's Strategic Plan 2015-2020 that describes exactly how the School will accomplish its strategic goals. NOSM publicly launched its new strategic plan in September, the details of which are available at <u>www.no smsp2020.ca</u>. Dr. Moira McPherson, Chair of the Northern Ontario School of Medicine's Board of Directors and VP, Academic and Provost at Lakehead, noted that the two-day meeting in Sudbury was a great success. "As NOSM celebrates its 10th anniversary, it's exciting to reflect on the progress the School has made in contributing to the health of the people and communities of Northern Ontario," says Dr. McPherson. "NOSM's success is truly a collaborative effort, and I am inspired by the Board's ongoing dedication to corporate governance and fiscal management at the School."

The Northern Ontario School of Medicine's next Board of Directors meeting is scheduled to occur on March 16, 2016.

NOSM Makes an Impact in Sudbury

The impact the Northern Ontario School of Medicine has had on Northern Ontario's health and economy was celebrated on Wednesday, November 18 at a leadership luncheon held by the Greater Sudbury Chamber of Commerce. NOSM, the first medical school to open in Canada in 30 years, celebrated its 10th anniversary earlier this year.



Founding dean, Dr. Roger Strasser, was one of four panelists who spoke to chamber members at the Radisson Hotel. The "genesis" of the school was in 2000 and 2001 with a widespread community movement to increase the number of family doctors in Northern Ontario by educating them here.

Strasser read excerpts from a Sudbury Star editorial that ran Sept. 14, 2005, the day after the medical school officially opened. At that time, then Sudbury mayor Jim Gordon called the opening of the medical school one of the most important announcements in Sudbury's history.
