Quorum: Unless otherwise stated in the approved terms of reference, quorum for Senate and all Senate committees is a simple majority of all filled positions.

Seven (7) days notice shall be given for all meetings except that a meeting may be held at any time without due notice if all members of the Committee are able to be present and/or consent thereto.

Composition:

- 1. Provost & Vice President (Academic) or designate
- 2. Vice-President (Administration & Finance)
- 3. One full-time faculty member from each academic Faculty (8)
- 4. Three students, at least one of whom must be a graduate student. Undergraduate student member(s) shall be elected by Senate on the recommendation of LUSU; graduate student member(s) shall be elected by Senate on the recommendation from LUSU in consultation with the Graduate Student Commissioner.
- 5. One representative from the Library
- 6. One representative of the Technology Services Centre
- 7. One representative from the Office of Continuing Education & Distributed Learning
- 8. Director of the Instructional Development Centre or designate
- 9. One full-time faculty member from the Orillia campus.

Terms of Office

- 1 & 2 ex officio
- 3 & 9 three-year terms (renewable)
- 4 one-year terms (renewable)
- 5 & 6 one-year terms (renewable)
- 7 & 8 ex officio

Organization

- 1. Chair: to be elected annually by the Committee from among the members of the Committee holding academic appointment
- 2. Secretary: staff member from the University Secretariat
- 3. Administrative Office: University Secretariat's Office

Terms of Reference

- 1. To promote and champion best practices in the use of information technology in all areas of teaching and research at Lakehead University;
- 2. To recommend to Senate general policies for the planning, development, and operation of information technology systems and services for the University;
- 3. To provide the exchange of ideas and consideration of questions related to information systems, technology and services in all aspects of the teaching and research functions of the University;
- 4. To develop regulations, in consultation with the TSC, on matters of academic significance with respect to systems services operated by TSC;
- 5. To provide the TSC advice regarding administrative systems and how they impact teaching and research activities.
