COURSE INTRODUCTION: An exploration of the history, theory, and practices of conflict resolution strategies that are alternatives to formal criminal justice practices, highlighting mediation and restorative justice. Students will focus on the evolution of these procedures, details of their application, critical reflections on offender sanctioning, and future directions for alternative conflict resolution strategies.

Credit Weight: 0.5

Prerequisite(s):

Two FCEs in Criminology, or permission of the Chair of the Department of Interdisciplinary Studies. Special topics in Criminology

COURSE OUTCOMES

By the end of the semester, students should be able to:

- Explain the history and development of restorative justice
- Identify the concepts and central principles of restorative justice
- Explain the roles of the victim, the offender and the community in restorative justice
- Compare and contrast retributive and restorative justice
- Describe the restorative justice processes e.g. victim-offender mediation, circles and group conferencing
- Understand the application of restorative justice principles to a wide range of conflicts and situations even within the established criminal justice system
- Recognize the benefits of restorative justice
- Identify the challenges associated with restorative justice

3. Group Oral Presentation

Students in groups of 4-5 can choose to present on the application of restorative concepts to real-world conflicts or on the development of restorative justice/ restorative practices across the world. The students may choose a creative arts approach or any other restorative techniques that fully or partially support restorative principles.

Presentations should be no more than 15-20 minutes long. Each group should explain why that topic was selected and how it advances restorative principles.

Aspects of restorative justice may be addressed are: confronting harm, taking of responsibility for actions, acknowledgement of the parties, recognizing the value of forgiveness and reconciliation, re-integrative shaming, participation of practical and symbolic restitution to victims, healing and repair/building of relationships.

- 2. <u>Plagiarism</u> of words occurs when phrases, sentences, tables or illustrations of an author or speaker are incorporated into the body of a writer's own, i.e. no quotations or indentations (depending on the format followed) are present but referencing or footnoting or end-noting is given.
- 3. <u>Plagiarism</u> of ideas and words as where words and an idea(s) of an author or speaker are incorporated into the body of a written assignment as though they were the writer's own words and ideas, i.e. no quotations or indentations (depending on format followed) are present and no referencing or footnoting or end-noting is given."
