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Course Description and Learning Outcomes

An analysis of the types, prevalence, characteristics, repercussions, and changing nature of youth crime in Canada. Emphasis will be placed on the various strategies that have been, and continue to be developed to remedy youth crime.

At the end of the course students should be able to:

- 1.-highlight that how youth crime is defined has tremendous implications for its control
- 2.-explain the knowledge claims among traditional criminology perspective, feminist theory and risk discourse
- 3.-explain the historic perspective on conceptions and treatment of children who break the law
- 4.-explain the tenets of the previous and present legislation for addressing youth crime
- 5.-understand the operation of the youth criminal justice system
- 6.-highlight the needs of special population groups-female youth, aboriginal youth, street involved youth and violent youths in relation to power and justice issues based on age, class, race and gender inequalities
- 7. expose students to responses to youth and crime
- 8. highlight the need for youths to speak out and be heard
