## **RBC Work Integrated Learning Program**

n the second year of the RBC WIL Program at Lakehead we continue to grow and expand the program to align with the RBC Future Launch vision of being a "catalyst for change-bringing people together to co-create solutions so young people are better prepared for the future of work."

The evaluation results from the 2017/2018 year indicate that the program has exceeded expectations of both students and supervisors/mentors. These results have guided future planning as the program continues to grow and expand to engage every FOBA student in experiential and work-integrated learning. The RBC WIL Program at Lakehead is being shared with post-secondary institutions across Canada and is becoming recognized as a best practice and trend-setting model in work-place readiness.

2018/2019 has 21 students engaged in real world learning that connects academic theory to practical

application. Students are currently placed with 17 organizations, 9 of which are new partners this year. Students report that they are increasingly confident in their skills development and that the RBC WIL Program has opened employment and career opportunities that they would otherwise not have realized.

In November, we celebrated the start of year 2 with a networking event for partners, students, and faculty. The highlight of the event was an address by student, Hilary Macdougall who is doing her placement at St. Joseph's Care Group under the supervision of Lynda Fares. Hilary's address ended with a statement that perfectly sums up the success of this program:

"After being only halfway through my placement, I can whole heartedly say that as RBC wanted to change the conversation in order to help Canadian youth in work environments. This project is a wonderful future launch which is successful in actually changing the conversation, and for that we are thankful."


His balance of work, play and community work also served him well and he was awarded a number of academic awards. during his time, such as:

"I have so many great memories at Lakehead, especially around my time as a student-athlete. My first year on the Thunderwolves varsity hockey team we won the Queen's Cup and went to Nationals in Edmonton, Alberta."

Born in North York, Ontario and raised in Orangeville. Ontario, Shandor was active athletically and academically, "My mom and dad worked hard to make sure my two sisters, my brother, and I had every opportunity to do well in life." Shandor played several sports growing up, but when he was entering his teenage years, it became very apparent that hockey was his passion. While playing AAA hockey he was drafted to the OHL by the Sudbury Wolves and played there for three seasons. He then played one season of Jr. A hockey for the Milton Ice Hawks before coming to Lakehead University.

Shandor joined the Faculty of Business Administration in 2005 in the Honours Bachelor of Commerce program and focused his studies on Information Systems.

Upon graduation in 2009, he immediately entered into the MBA program, graduating in 2010. After completing his MBA, Alphonso moved back home to Orangeville and took a full-time job as an Account Manager with RBC. "Lakehead did a great job preparing me for my future. Through a Lakehead connection, I got my start with RBC after my third year. This gave me the opportunity to apply the things I was learning in class, in real-world business settings."

## Michelle Henderson

hrough a series of circumstances, Michelle Henderson was not initially given the opportunity to pursue a post-secondary education, however, she always felt that this would be her path. Upon graduating from Hammarskjold High School in Thunder Bay, she began a career in retail sales, holding several management level roles. Michelle explains that, while she enjoyed the work, she saw the value in gaining more formal education to complement the skills she had developed in her roles.

Initially, Michelle attended Confederation College and obtained her Diploma in Business Administration, majoring in Accounting. "I really enjoyed college and I had decided that I wanted to become a CPA, which meant that I needed a degree. I chose Lakehead as they have excellent college-transfer opportunities for this program and it meant I could stay in my hometown."

Upon completion of her Honours Bachelor of Commerce (Accounting) degree in the spring of 2018, Michelle received the J. Armand Bombardier Ontario Scholarship in Business. The purpose of this scholarship is to support eligible students in the University's business graduate programs, including its Master of Science in Management and Master of Business Administration programs. ### **Caitlund Davidson**

aitlund Davidson's journey to the MBA program came from a unique educational situation. Born and raised in Thunder Bay, Caitlund came to Lakehead, directly from high school, to pursue her undergraduate degree in Applied Biomolecular Science (now called Applied Life Science). She then went on to obtain her Master of Science in Biology, at Lakehead, graduating this past Spring. As she was in the final stages of her MSc, she began to think about what to do next, "a year ago I wasn't sure I wanted to continue with school. I was trying to decide between continuing with education or entering the workforce."

The professors I have worked with along the way have been genuinely interested in helping me develop career goals and I appreciated the amount of time they invested in making sure I received the most out of my time at Lakehead.

During her decision making, Caitlund found that she was drawn to the MBA program, as she wanted to expand her knowledge and build a base for her future career in the medical research field. "I hope to give back to my community by opening a laboratory or starting a company where I can provide students with the opportunity to discover research and share my passion for science."

Caitlund was initially hesitant about continuing with a second Masters degree, due to the financial burden it would place on her. "Then I had heard of Ontario Graduate Scholarships and that there was a new opportunity for students pursuing an MBA. Caitlund



applied and was successful in receiving the J. Armand Bombardier Ontario Scholarship in Business in the Spring of 2018. The purpose of this scholarship is to support eligible students in the University's business graduate programs, including its Master of Science in Management and Master of Business Administration programs.

Caitlund recalls her surprise when she learnt that she was the recipient. "The financial assistance from this has helped me to focus more time on my studies since I am not worried about working to pay the entire value of tuition. This scholarship was a huge factor in my decision to enrol in the MBA program." We wish Caitlund continued success as she pursues her MBA.

### FACULTY PROFILE



**Kathy Sanderson** 

Dr. Kathy Sanderson's journey to Lakehead travelled along a very rich and diverse road. Starting as a researcher with a women's shelter in Northwestern Ontario, Kathy studied to become a Psychotherapist and worked within various health care organizations, serving as the Executive Director for the Crossroads Centre Alcohol

and Drug Recovery Home for 16 years.

During those 16 years, she also obtained her Masters of Management from Lakehead University in 2004, focusing her research and thesis on Women and CEO Succession,

as well as her PhD in Business Administration from St. Mary's University in 2017, with a dissertation on the Lived Experiences of Ostracism at Work.

Kathy was a part of the first Masters of Management cohort, in 2004, and it was based on this experience that led her to pursue her PhD. "The courses had great variety and the faculty were accessible and helpful. They encouraged me to present at an academic conference and encouraged me to complete a PhD. I feel very fortunate to get to work alongside some of those professors who were so supportive of me."

While Kathy enjoyed her time working in both the public and private sectors, she feels most at home teaching at Lakehead University. "the real reason that I teach is that I enjoy the student interaction. I try to bring my previous management experience into the classroom to make sure that the theories are relevant and meaningful to the students." Kathy uses the environment and community around her to relate the theories she is teaching to the work her students take part in.

More specifically, "for the past two years, the Human Resources Planning class has worked on projects with Resolute Forest Products. This gives the students a chance to work on a very difficult human resources problem, and the entire textbook can be applied to the case study. At the end of the course, they present their findings to the management of Resolute and have always received very positive feedback. A few of the student ideas have already been implemented at Resolute!" Kathy also gives the students a chance to apply their learning to non-traditional business environments, such as taking part in Research and Innovation week, where they presented posters which illustrated their research on supply and demand. This is typically a science-focused event, however, the inclusion of business students offered a more holistic approach to the industry.

Kathy is currently teaching Human Resources Management, Human Resources Planning, and Organizational Behaviour. These are offered at both the undergraduate (third year) and MBA level. She is also coordinating an informal human resources group on campus, which serves as a resource for those looking to pursue their Human Resources Professional Association (HRPA) designation.

Kathy's research is focused on topics such as emotional abuse within the workplace, concentrating on ostracism and rejection. Kathy is motivated by research and projects that explores material related to making work less painful for employees, in particular women.

While her life, work and studies have taken Kathy to Spain, Finland, Japan and Norway, one of her favourite places to be is sitting outside the Lakehead campus, taking in the scenery. "I was by Lake Tamblyn this past summer having lunch and I saw an otter swimming!"
