

- Limits (intuitive definition, one-sided limits, infinite limits, limits laws, trigonometric limits, vertical and horizontal asymptotes, squeeze theorem)
- Continuity (definition, types of continuous functions, types of discontinuities, intermediate value theorem)
- Derivatives (geometric and algebraic interpretation, differentiability and continuity, power rule, product rule, quotient rule, chain rule, implicit differentiation, higher derivatives, derivative formulas, derivatives of inverse functions)
- Applications of Derivatives (extreme value theorem, mean value theorem, monotonicity and concavity, extrema, inflection points, first derivative test, second derivative test, optimization problems, L'Hospital's Rule, exponential growth and decay, rate of change in life and social sciences, related rates, curve sketching)

Learner Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Analyze and describe functions (including piecewise functions and inverse functions); identify symmetries; and create new functions through transformations, algebraic operations and composition.
- Calculate limits graphically, numerically and algebraically, applying limit laws, the squeeze theorem, and trigonometric limits.
- Identify and classify asymptotes and discontinuities of functions, and apply the Intermediate Value Theorem to solve problems involving continuous functions.
- Interpret and compute the derivative of functions using the limit definition, understanding its meaning as slope of the tangent line and instantaneous rate of change.
- Differentiate functions using power, product, quotient, and chain rule; apply implicit differentiation and compute higher-order derivatives.
- Apply the Extreme Value Theorem and Mean Value Theorem to analyze function behavior, and identify extrema.
- Analyze and sketch graphs of functions by determining intervals of increase/decrease, concavity, local extrema, and inflection points using First and Second Derivative Tests.
- Model and solve real-world problems involving exponential growth and decay, optimization, related rates, and apply L'Hospital's Rule for indeterminate forms.
