UBCIC Challenges Kamloops Gold Mine Decision

(Coast Salish Territory/Vancouver) – UBCIC President Grand Chief Stewart Phillip today called on the BC Minister of Mines, Kevin Krueger, to reverse a recent provincial decision granting a mining permit for a gold mine near Kamloops, citing the government's failure to accommodate the aboriginal interests of local Shuswap Nation Benderated.

"This permit was granted prematurely," said Grand Chief Phillip, "because the Kamloops and Skeetchesth Bands were not given a fair opportunity to be consulted and to reconcile their interests with those of the government and the mining industry. It is insulting to make BC First Nations communities wait in poverty for a provincial policy on sharing mining revenues while the government rushes to give away the unceded lands and resources of those same communities to a mining company based in Toronto."

Grand Chief Phillip pointed out that in 2005 the BC Government committed itself to share resource revenues with First Nations under the so-called New Relationship policy, but since that time there has been a "total policy vacuum" on revenue sharing in the mining industry.

NewSold Inc., a Toronto company, has made millions on the Toronto Stock Exchange based on a mining tenure that the BC Government gave the company without consulting the Kamloops and Skeetchesin Indian Bands (KDSN - Kamloops Division of the Shuswap Nation) in whose unceded territory the project is to take place. Further the province has exempted NewGold's project from a full environmental review. Though plans for the project have been developing for the past several years the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources only approached the KDSN bands in November 2006, and has not provided them with enough time or funding to obtain independent expert advise on the project.

"This government and Minister Krueger are in gross default of their duty to respect the interests of First Nations before giving away their lands and resources to outsiders" he stated. "First Nations communities have been here for generations upon generations. We are sick of seeing the mining industry destroy our lands and waters and then walk away with mega profits, leaving no economic benefits behind."

The proposed mine is to be built on the old Afton Mine site, previously occupied by Tech Cominco, which during the 1977-1997 period created a huge crater on the landscape, extensive dumping of tallings, and the destruction of a lake in the Cherry Creek watershed, but provided no economic benefits or compensation to the local Shuswap Nation bands.

PROVINCE TO SHARE MINING BENEFITS WITH FIRST NATIONS

VICTORIA – The Province has authorized its provincial negotiators to include revenue sharing with First Nations on new mining projects, Minister of State for Mining Gordon Hogg announced today, British Columbia is the first province in Canada to share direct revenue generated from mining.

The process for development of revenue sharing will be decided on a project-by-project basis. Revenue sharing on new mining projects will place a strong focus on community development to assist First Nations in achieving their social and economic goals.

"Government is prepared to share the direct benefits of mining with First Nations," Hogg said.

"Revenue sharing is one of the key elements of the New Relationship and will help to build a more inclusive and prosperous future for all British Columbians."

The revenue-sharing approach will be used where there is a proposed project that will result in a new stream of direct resource revenue to the Province. This process will ensure that First Nations receive revenue throughout the life of those mining projects.

Aboriginal leaders have asked government to include revenue sharing on new mine developments and there will be further discussions with the First Nation Leadership Council on how revenue sharing will

The mining industry has also been clear that First Nations need to be included in the revenue stream

"The Province looks forward to working co-operatively with industry and First Nations to develop profitably and environmentally sensitive projects for the benefit of all British Columbians," Hogg added.

The mining industry is already working with First Nations, and the Province supports them in continuing their efforts. British Columbia is building a new relationship with First Nations founded on mutual respect, recognition and reconciliation, which will support Aboriginal people's participation in the province's economic and social progress.

ECONOMIC AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN IN RIGHT OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

as represented by the Minister of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources and the Minister of Forests and Range and Minister Responsible for Integrated Land Management Bureau ("British Columbia")

and

STK'EMLÚPSEMC OF THE SECWEPEMC NATION

as represented by the Tk'emlúps Indian Band and the Skeetchestn Indian Band ("SSN")

(collectively referred to as the "Parties")

WHEREAS

- A. New Gold, Inc. has proposed to develop the New Afton Mine Project (the "Project") at the site of the historic Afton Mine, approximately 10 kilometres west of Kamloops;
- The Project site is within the traditional territory of Tk'emlûps and Skeetchestn, which together comprise the Stk'emlûpseme of the Secwepeme Nation;
- C. The Parties will utilize this Economic and Community Development Agreement to demonstrate leadership and respect for each others' interests, while developing a successful long-term working relationship intended to address fundamental SSN concerns, including those presented in the 1910 Memorial to Sir Wilfred Laurier;
- D. The Parties acknowledge that British Columbia and SSN have undertaken a shared commitment to strengthening relationships on a government-to-government basis, and on focusing efforts to close the socio-economic and cultural gaps between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples, which will require a relationship between SSN and British Columbia based on enhanced collaboration,
