Course Description: In this course, we will study the relationships between Islam and the west by examining current issues and their historical roots, including colonialism and neo-colonialism, orientalism, the (re)production of the clash of civilizations, and the war on terror. We will focus on the representations of Islam and Muslim people and the interplay between these depictions, political economy factors and their links to power and resistance.

Learning Outcomes: Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to: (1) assess a multiplicity of perspectives on the relationships between Islam and the West including the complex reasons for hostilities, tensions and problems, and their historical, political and economic roots; (2) assess theoretical explanations of root causes of problems; (3) critically analyze the impact of politics of foreign intervention on radicalization here at home and abroad; (4) analyze the causes of political crime including global violence and terrorism and their impact internationally and here at home: (5) deconstruct the role of ideologies, discourses, the media in understanding the origin and persistence of Islamophobia and othering, and; (6) appraise the policies and programs that are aimed at combating the problem of radicalism in Canada and internationally.
