How will this impact The provision of a thesis option will reduce the number of existing teaching loads courses that students are required to take. As it currently within this faculty/unit?: operates, SJS is a course heavy degree (4.0 FCEs). Even those students enrolled in the research/creative/practicum streams are still required to take 3.0 FCEs. The addition of a thesis option would reduce the course requirement to 1.5 FCES with the thesis being equivalent to 2.5FCEs. Decreasing the number of courses students are required to take will reduce the burden on the courses offered by other departments with extant graduate programs.
