Course Description: An exploration of the process of death investigation through corresponding scientific, legal, and social perspectives, including an investigation of the tools, techniques, and protocols associated with the performance of rigorous forensic death investigations at the scene and in autopsy. Students will study forensic pathology that emphasizes the principles of forensic death investigation. Critical reflection is also dedicated to subjectivity in forensics investigations, including debated techniques, cases, and the influence of social milieus and identities on objectivity in science.

The "Professional Field Exposure" class would be a superior alternative to Field Placements for Lakehead Criminology students because it would (1) address liability concerns that make field placement highly challenging, (2) expose students to a much wider variety of career options than placements could provide, and (3) incorporate career preparation development (i.e., skills as well as physical materials) into the experience.
