~~30yy, and 30zz, see 2015-soc-5324) in support of our proposed new concentrations (see 2015-soc-5321). These courses are suitable alternatives for INTD 3010. The only difference between each of them is their specific topic (INTD 3010 is a special topics course), so any of these courses will be suitable prerequisites for INTD 4901. We have also eliminated ENSU 3053 as a possible prerequisite as it was included as an alternative for those ENSU students who were interested in pursuing an honours thesis. However, ENSU 4901 has since been introduced for these students. As these students no longer will be taking INTD 4901, there is no need for ENSU 3035 to be a possible prerequisite. We are also eliminating the course classifications for this course. Previously it was classified as A, B, C, and D, but that was due to the fact that the content could have covered any of these areas and not that it necessarily would cover any of these areas. This will not impact students' completion of their breadth requirements as the program regulations stipulate that students cannot use INTD courses towards their breadth requirements.
