Three Year program

An overall 60% average through each year is required in the Interdisciplinary Studies Major, any additional elective Interdisciplinary Studies courses taken, and any additional elective courses taken in the disciplinary area. The Interdisciplinary Studies Major consists of 7 FCEs: two (2) FCE of Interdisciplinary Studies courses and five (5) FCEs in the disciplinary area.

Note 1:

All students will satisfactorily complete four Interdisciplinary Studies courses: one-half (0.5) full course equivalents (FCE) at first-year level, Interdisciplinary 2010, Interdisciplinary 2030, and one-half (0.5) FCE at third-year level.

Note 2:

Students must complete five (5) full-course equivalents (FCEs) in a discipline: one (1) FCE at the first-year level, one (1) FCE at the second-year level, one (1) FCE at the second-year level or above, and two (2) FCEs at the third or fourth year level. Eligible disciplines are Anthropology, Biology, Chemistry, Criminology, English, French, Gender and Women's Studies, General Science (as defined as a "Teachable" by the Faculty of Education), Geography, History, Media, Film, and Communications, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, or permission of the Chair of the Department of Interdisciplinary Studies.

Pedagogical rationale for These-There are housekeeping-two changes and updates to the HBASc IS Major and BASc IS Major programs:1) Two new required courses, INTD 20x0 Modern Debates and INTD 20y0 Numbers in Social Context are being added to the Interdisciplinary Studies majors. These courses are intended to meet core degree learning objectives, namely, helping students acquire the knowledge and skills to a) articulate basic social, historical, cultural, political, and economic theories and perspectives (INTD 20x0 Modern Debates); and b) evaluate the validity of arguments based on qualitative and quantitative information in order to accept or challenge the findings of others (INTD 20v0 Numbers in Social Context). The courses will be taught through the problem-based learning pedagogy foundational to the Interdisciplinary Studies degree. These courses will also advance several other crucial degree learning outcomes, including critical thinking and argument, oral and written communication, and problem-based analysis and judgment, all of which are required for success in their upper-year courses. In addition, the disciplinary areas requirement is being slightly amended so that students may take more upper-year courses in their disciplinary areas and will more evenly distribute the courses in their major across their second and third years, with disciplinary area and Interdisciplinary Studies courses in each year. The new courses will also provide a cohort-building experience and help students develop a stronger sense of their identity as Interdisciplinary Studies Majors by giving them continuity in their major over each year level, as is normal in most undergraduate degree programs.2) The second year "methodological" course requirement is being revised. Currently to this degree. The first is the addition of Philosophy as a discipline that students might choose to study. The second is revisions to the list of core disciplinary courses. In the last revision of the degree, starting Sept. 2022, students are required to complete a course from a list of second year "methodological" courses; however, not all of these courses are methodological in nature and some disciplines are not represented in the list. The courses in the list will, therefore, be relabeled as "core disciplinary" courses and the second year restriction will be dropped. This will enable the future development the list to better represent each discipline with core courses that are more appropriate to that discipline. In order to ensure that students choose more appropriate courses from this list, they will be required to choose a course from at least one of their disciplinary areas. Finally, Chemistry 2111, Chemistry 2211, and French 2101 will be added to the list of core disciplinary courses. 3) Chemistry and French are being added as disciplinary areas. These two disciplinary areas add welcome diversity to the range of disciplinary areas currently offered in the IS major programs. Chemistry programming has been significantly expanded on the Orillia campus because of the Lakehead/Georgian Applied Life Sciences program. Students now have the opportunity to satisfy the requirements of the IS Major, and this degree also offers a fall-back option for Applied Life Sciences students who do not continue in the Lakehead/Georgian program. Finally, French is a subject in high demand in Orillia. Interdisciplinary Studies has traditionally paid for French courses as part of the

Concurrent Education program, and the Department of Languages has committed to expanding French offerings available to Orillia students.4) A restriction is being placed on students using INTD courses towards their Type A or B and Type C or D breadth requirements. This follows on the introduction of course type classifications on the INTD courses in order to maintain the same level of course breadth as before these classification changes"core disciplinary course" within at least one of their disciplines. - at least two (2) one-semester courses of math, science, geography, or introductory psychology
- at least one (1) one-semester course in Inquiry methods or Senior Academic Research (see Lakehead University Admissions website for list of acceptable college courses;
- at least two (2) one-semester college courses of advanced academic content (see Lakehead University Admissions website for list of acceptable college courses)
- at least two (2) introductory one-semester college courses in one (1) of the following disciplines: Anthropology, Biology, Chemistry, English Literature,

French, Geography, General Science, History, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology (see Lakehead University Admissions website for list of acceptable college courses)

Students lacking such courses will be required to take them at Lakehead University.

This program requires completion of five (5) FCEs in one discipline, the first FCE of which should have been completed as part of the college diploma. 

All students will satisfactorily complete five Interdisciplinary Studies courses: one-half (0.5) full course equivalents (FCE) at first-year level, Interdisciplinary Studies 2010, Interdisciplinary Studies 2030, one-half (0.5) FCE at third-year level, and one (1) FCE at fourth-year level.

Note 2:

Students must complete five (5) full-course equivalents (FCEs) in one discipline and five (5) FCEs in a second discipline: one (1) FCE each at the first-year level, one (1) FCE each at the second-year level, one (1) FCE each at the second year level or above, and two (2) FCEs each at the third or fourth year level. Eligible disciplines are Anthropology, Biology, Chemistry, Criminology, English, Entrepreneurship (see Note 3), French, Gender and Women's Studies, General Science (as defined as a "Teachable" by the Faculty of Education), Geography, History, Media, Film, and Communications, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology or permission of the Chair of the Department of Interdisciplinary Studies. Students completing Entrepreneurship as one of their disciplines must take MATH 0210 or MATH 0212 as their core disciplinary course before starting the second year Business courses (see Note 5).

The Interdisciplinary Studies Major consists of 12 FCEs: two (2) FCEs of Interdisciplinary Studies courses, five (5) FCEs in the first discipline, and five (5) FCEs in the second discipline.

In Concurrent Education programs at the Primary/Junior level, students must meet and complete requirements of the partnering degree program including all Pre-Professional Program Education requirements (see Concurrent Degree Programs Information for Education requirements). A student registered in a Concurrent Education program must maintain a minimum cumulative average of 65%.

Pedagogical rationale for this proposal. Why are you submitting this request?: These There are housekeeping two changes and updates to the HBASc IS Major and BASc IS Major programs:1) Two new required courses, INTD 20x0 Modern Debates and INTD 20y0 Numbers in Social Context are being added to the Interdisciplinary Studies majors. These courses are intended to meet core degree learning objectives, namely, helping students acquire the knowledge and skills to a) articulate basic social, historical, cultural, political, and economic theories and perspectives (INTD 20x0 Modern Debates); and b) evaluate the validity of arguments based on qualitative and quantitative information in order to accept or challenge the findings of others (INTD 20y0 Numbers in Social Context). The courses will be taught through the problem-based learning pedagogy foundational to the Interdisciplinary Studies degree. These courses will also advance several other crucial degree learning outcomes, including critical thinking and argument, oral and written communication, and problem-based analysis and judgment, all of which are required for success in their upper-year courses. In addition, the disciplinary areas requirement is being slightly amended so that students may take more upper-year courses in their disciplinary areas and will more evenly distribute the courses in their major across their second, third, and fourth years, with disciplinary area and Interdisciplinary Studies courses in each year. Currently students are required to take 4 FCEs in disciplinary areas and no Interdisciplinary Studies courses in second year with little elective space, while there is more elective space and fewer disciplinary area courses in the third and fourth years. The new courses will also provide a cohort-building experience and help students develop a stronger sense of their identity as Interdisciplinary Studies Majors by giving them continuity in their major over each year level, as is normal in most undergraduate degree programs.2) The second year "methodological" course requirement is being revised. Currently students are required to complete a course from a list of second year "methodological" courses; however, not all of these courses are methodological in nature and some disciplines are not represented in the list. The courses in the list will, therefore, be relabeled as "core disciplinary" courses and the second year restriction will be dropped. This will enable the future development the list to better represent each discipline with core courses that are more appropriate to that discipline. In order to ensure that students choose more appropriate courses from this list, they will be required to choose a course from at least one of their disciplinary areas. Finally, Chemistry 2111, Chemistry 2211, and French 2101 will be added to the list of core disciplinary courses. 3) Chemistry, Entrepreneurship, and French are being added as disciplinary areas. These three disciplinary areas add welcome diversity to the range of disciplinary areas currently offered in the IS major programs. Chemistry programming has been significantly expanded on the Orillia campus because of the Lakehead/Georgian Applied Life Sciences program. Students

now have the opportunity to satisfy the requirements of the IS Major, and this degree also offers a fall-back option for Applied Life Sciences students who do not continue in the Lakehead/Georgian program. Orillia students have expressed a longstanding interest in a Business disciplinary area within the IS Major. Working with the Business program in Orillia, the disciplinary area of Entrepreneurship has been developed that provides a focused selection of Business courses that can be applied to satisfy the IS major requirements - these Business courses are already offered in Orillia and do not require additional resources. Finally, French is a subject in high demand in Orillia. Interdisciplinary Studies has traditionally paid for French courses as part of the Concurrent Education program, and the Department of Languages has committed to expanding French offerings available to Orillia students.4) A restriction is being placed on students using INTD courses towards their Type A or B and Type C or D breadth requirements. This follows on the introduction of course type classifications on the INTD courses in order to maintain the same level of course breadth as before these classification changes to this degree. The first is the addition of Philosophy as a discipline that students might choose to study. The second is revisions to the list of core disciplinary courses. In the last revision of the degree, starting Sept. 2022, students are required to complete a "core disciplinary course" within at least one of their disciplines. The list of eligible courses was incomplete as it did not include at least one course for each discipline. The new list includes at least one course for each discipline. Additionally, courses on this list were previously restricted to 2nd year "methodological" courses. This restriction was dropped starting 2022-23 and as a consequence contributing departments were invited to revise the course(s) they contribute to this list. Several departments recommended different or additional courses, which appear on the revised list.
