Course Description: ~~Provides students with an introduction to quantitative analysis, including descriptive data, numerical measures, continuous and discrete probability distributions, sampling and central limit theorem, estimation and confidence~~

~~intervals, one-sample tests of hypothesis, an introduction to regression and correlation~~ This course introduces students to the principles and techniques of descriptive and inferential statistics as they apply to business decision-making. Emphasis is placed on data analysis, probability concepts, sampling, estimation, hypothesis testing, correlation, and regression analysis. Emphasis is placed on interpreting statistical results and applying statistical reasoning to solve practical business problems.

This course and Business 1076 are 2 0.5 FCE courses that would replace Business 1066 (1 FCE). The reason for the change is to provide greater flexibility to students who transfer from other programs or institutions to meet the degree requirements. Secondly it will enable students who require upgrading to potentially only have to take 0.5 FCE credit rather a 1.0 FCE course request is one of the many changes that are being proposed as a result of an undergraduate curriculum review that was conducted in the Faculty of Business Administration.
