Learning Outcomes: One particular goal of this class is to stress that the lived realities of people need to be given special attention through any act of social theorizing. As a result, specific emphasis will be placed on relating theoretical material to everyday experience. A caveat though. In many cases we will be explicitly drawing attention to aspects of embodiment that are normally kept private and confidential. The topic under study is deeply familiar, indeed intimate, so specific care needs to be made to ensure that classroom dialogue remains considerate of the different bodies that will populate the classroom.
