Geography of the Arctic Regions

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Learning Objectives

Intellectual objectives are to explore the Arctic regions from a human geography perspective and to become familiar with several concepts in geographic thought including identity and the interaction between environment and culture. The skills objectives are to improve academic research, writing and presentation skills. This is to allow students to effectively transition to senior year and potentially to complete independent projects, attend graduate or professional school, or enter a career.

Homework

Most homework will include study questions. The study questions are to guide your reading and draw attention to major points. Exams may or may not include these questions and knowing the answers to these questions does not guarantee you will be successful on an exam. Bring a hard copy of your answers to class with your name on it each day. Homework will sometimes be collected and marked to contribute to your participation mark. Also, in-class quizzes may occur at any time on that day's homework. These may also be used to calculate your participation mark.

Paper

The <u>term paper</u> is broken into <u>four parts</u> to train students in writing at a senior level in university. Support offered for each part will help students develop appropriate writing skills and improve the end product. For the paper outline, students will select a topic and 2 regions to compare. They will provide 1 paragraph (150 words) outlining the paper and 3 common subtopics that will be explored for each case study (this will set up the comparison later). Five peer-reviewed references must be included and referenced properly in the paragraph. Also the student will indicate on this submission their preference for the case study to be presented and the preferred time period (mid-term or end of term).

The case studies are short papers, one on each case study region (1200 words each). They will be organized as literature reviews of the topic in the chosen region and include the 3 sub-topics mentioned in the outline. The outline must be resubmitted with each case study for comparative purposes. The final paper will include a resubmission of the outline, both case studies and a final essay that includes a introduction, the case studies and a comparison of the two (3000 words total). Presentation

Each student will present <u>one</u> of his/her case studies to the class. Students will sign up for one of the presentation periods (the professor will finalize the schedule) and present the case study due at that time. The professor reserves the right to assign students to present on a particular day in order to manage our time. Presentations will be 12 minutes with 5 minutes of questions and <u>must</u> include visuals.

*Note that students will be required to attend each presentation in order to take notes for exams. Students are also expected to write down one question per presentation as part of their participation mark.
