COURSE DESCRIPTION

An examination of the physical and social structure of the North American city, with emphasis on problems in modern urban planning. Specific reference is made to the definition and implementation of sustainable community designs.

ASSIGNMENTS

Assignment 1: As a university student you have had to make a residential choice: stay at home, live in residence, rent a house or apartment with other students, live in a rented basement (legal or illegal), live in your van or possibly some other option. Describe your choice and explain why you have chosen it. (If you have tried several options you may compare them). Evaluate if it has been a good decision or a bad one. If you wish to talk to your roommates or your classmates you may do so but you cannot conduct a questionnaire survey without approval of the ethics committee. In addition to your own research find three written articles (academic or non-academic) related to this topic.

Your report should be typed double spaced Times New Roman 12pt (or equivalent) 1500 words of text (+/- 10%) plus any tables, maps, figures as appropriate and a proper works cited page (bibliography)

Use the APA (author, date) method of referencing in the text.

The paper should be submitted in class

The penalty for a late essay is a deduction of 10% of the mark unless an extension has been arranged prior to the due date. Illness and bereavement are acceptable reasons. Too much work is not. Students who are members of sports teams that will be away that day may submit their paper to me via email.

Assignment 2: Write an essay about a housing issue in your home community. In addition to locally published material and/or media coverage, find three academic studies related to this issue.

Your report should be typed double spaced Times New Roman 12pt (or equivalent) 2000 words of text (+/- 10%) plus any tables, maps, figures as appropriate and a proper works cited page (bibliography)

Use the APA (author, date) method of referencing in the text.

The paper should be submitted in class with exceptions noted above.

Mid term & Final A series of short answer questions covering the topics of the course (equally weighted) The questions at the end of text chapters may be used.

The following rules shall govern the treatment of candidates who have been found guilty of attempting to obtain academic credit dishonestly.

- (a) The minimum penalty for a candidate found guilty of plagiarism, or of cheating on any part of a course will be a zero for the work concerned.
- (b) A candidate found guilty of cheating on a formal examination or a test, or of serious or repeated plagiarism, or of unofficially obtaining a copy of an examination paper before the examination is scheduled to be written, will receive zero for the course and may be expelled from the University.

Students disciplined under the Code of Student Behaviour and Disciplinary Procedures may appeal their case through the Judicial Panel.

Note: "Plagiarism" shall be deemed to include:

1. Plagiarism of ideas as where an idea of an author or speaker is incorporated into the body of an assignment as though it were the writer's idea, i.e. no credit is given the person through referencing or footnoting or endnoting.
2. Plagiarism of words occurs when phrases, sentences, tables or illustrations of an author or speaker are incorporated into the body of a writer's own, i.e. no quotations or indentations (depending on the format followed) are present but referencing or footnoting or endnoting is given.
3. Plagiarism of ideas and words as where words and an idea(s) of an author or speaker are incorporated into the body of a written assignment as though they were the writer's own words and ideas, i.e. no quotations or indentations (depending on format followed) are present and no referencing or footnoting or endnoting is given.

4. Submission of another person's work as your own is considered plagiarism
