Course Description:

A student-driven weekly seminar focused on Canada's North (Arctic/Subactic) and 'near-North'—their histories, cultures, geography, and environments. This course is designed to:

- 1. Strengthen your ability to critically evaluate scholarly (peer-reviewed) literature;
- 2. Develop your presentation and collaboration skills, as well as your skills in leading small group discussions:
- 3. Strengthen your written communication skills;
- 4. Expose you to the varied literature on northern peoples and their environments (past and present).

Evaluation:

Seminar leadership: 25%

• Every week, two to three students will be responsible for selecting a topic and leading the discussion of roughly 2 key articles (each). These articles must be distributed to the other students in the class well in advance of the seminar. The topic chosen is open but it should comfortably fall within the overall 'theme' of the week. Evaluation is based on: the appropriateness and relevance of papers selected; the quality of seminar leadership; and depth of background knowledge of the selected topic.

Class participation: 25%

• Regular attendance and thoughtful, informed, participation are expected for each seminar.

Short written assignments: 50%

- Paper #1: Personal reflection on the relevance of northern research, description of your career aspirations and what practical steps are required for you to achieve them. Length: ~500 words. Value: 5%. Due: Week 3
- Paper #2: A concise summary of sub-topic selected under theme #1. Length: ~1000 words. Value: 15%. This paper must be well-researched and referenced. Due: Week 6.
- Paper #3: A concise summary of sub-topic selected under theme #2. Length: ~1000 words. Value: 15%. This paper must be well-researched and referenced. Due: Week 9.
- Paper #4: A concise summary of sub-topic selected under theme #3. Length: ~1000 words. Value: 15%. This paper must be well-researched and referenced. Due: Week 12.
