Course Description:

The objective of the course is to introduce the topic of fluvial geomorphology. The course will provide students with an overview of the fluvial systems and their dynamics. Students will become familiar with basic concepts such as flow regime, role of sediments, channel geometry and system response to change such as flood or flow obstructions. Material will be presented to students in lectures, with some field excursion to complement the classroom learning experience. Although there are no labs scheduled for the course, students may be expected to complete some take home assignments.

Course Objectives:

- Channelized Flow
