Course Description:

In this course, we conduct a systematic regional survey of the Northern European cultural region. Students will gain an appreciation of regional cultural diversity, history, politics and economy. Physical geography of the region will also be covered. Broad course topics will be introduced in lectures while assigned readings will allow for more detailed regional case studies.

Course Objectives:

The following topics will be discussed in lectures:

Northern Europe - physical extent and boundaries
Physiography and climate
Politics
European Union

Northern European cultural identities

Historic population migrations in Northern Europe Languages Religion and ethnic identity

Economics of the North
Financial Centres
European Integration

This course will be organized by regions. Lectures will discuss each country/region of northern Europe while emphasizing the larger issues listed above.

Regions of special interest:

The Netherlands:

- Dutch attitudes towards personal freedoms (the notorious Dutch "liberality")
- Dutch relationship with their peculiar geographic natural environment setting (dealing with floods as a national policy)
