Student success

Our students continue to excel on the national stage. Douglas Nikkila has been awarded the Gelinas Bronze medal for the best Canadian Honours thesis from the Volcanology and Igneous Petrology Division of the Geological Association of Canada. Doug's thesis, supervised by Dr. Shannon Zurevinski, was on "The mineralogy and petrology of a newly discovered REE occurrence within the Coldwell Complex near Marathon, Ontario". Jordan Baird, who has featured in these newsletters before, re-

ceived the GAC-PDAC Logan Student Prize for Lakehead University.

Faculty success

The last couple of months have also brought considerable success for our newest faculty. Dr. Amanda Diochon has received funding from the Grain Farmers of Ontario for a project entitled "Assessing soil organic matter quality as an attribute of soil health in long-term tillage and crop rotation experiments". Along with additional funding from the Senate Research Com-

mittee this means that Amanda is in the process of recruiting two new MSc students. Dr. Shannon Zurevinski has also been succesful, she has been awarded an NSERC Discovery Grant to investigate the "Mineralogy, petrology and isotope systematics of Proterozoic continental rift-related alkaline magmatism, Northwestern Ontario, Canada". Shannon has recruited Doug Nikkila to work on this project for his MSc. Finally, Dr. Pete Hollings received the 2014 NSERC Distinguished Researcher Award from Lakehead University. The award is the highest honour conferred by Lakehead for research and scholarly activity. Pete said "I have spent the last 13 years building a research team at Lakehead that focused on the origin of ore deposits around the world – and to have that work recognized in this way is a huge honour".

Scholarships & Awards

Every year, thanks to the generous support of industry and our alumni we are able to present a number of scholarships to our students. This year the Rubicon Minerals Corp. Geology Award was presented to Amy Cleaver while the New Gold Rainy River Resources Ltd. Geology Award was given to Chanelle Boucher. The Bernie Schnieders Memorial Award went to Mike D'Angelo, who is working on a Masters thesis investigating the petrology and geochemistry of the Guichon batholith that hosts the Highland Valley porphyry system in British Columbia. This fund was set up in 2005 in memory of Bernie and Mike is now the ninth student to benefit from it's support. In addition Simon Dolega who is working on a study of "Deformation of Timiskaming-type conglomerates" received the Barrick Gold Graduate Scholarship and Daniel LaFontaine who is undertaking an MSc on the Borden Gold Project received the Ben Cowan Graduate Scholarship. Finally Sean O'Brien, who has just started a thesis on the Ni-Cu-PGE mineralised Crystal Lake Gabbro received a Graduate Student Fellowship from the Society of Economic Geologists Canada Foundation.

New Awards

At our annual Alumni and Friends breakfast at PDAC this year we were thrilled to announce two new awards to the Centre or Excellence for Sustainable Mining and Exploration (CESME) that will benefit our students

in years to come. Generous gifts from Dr. Jim Franklin and alumnus Phil Walford (*Class of '70*) have helped establish the Dr. Melville Bartley CESME Memorial Scholarship that will support students undertaking research into mining, exploration and the environment. We were also excited to announce that Sue Craig (*MSc - Class of 91*) was establishing the John R. Craig Memorial CESME Award to support graduate students undertaking research related to First Nations and Métis issues.
