Steve has been awarded Emeritus status at Lakehead and will be continuing to work closely with the Department.

Shannon Zurevinski is pleased to be returning to the Geology department in August. She spent the last few years here in Thunder Bay as the Mineral Deposit Compilation Geoscientist for Northwestern Ontario with the Resident Geologist Program of the Ontario Geological Survey. Shannon is a mineralogist and her most recent research has focused on the mineralogy, petrology and isotopic geochemistry of mantle-derived rocks (kimberlites and related rocks). She characterizes the mantle rocks utilizing a variety of analytical techniques such as optical microscopy, back-scattered electron petrographic methods, thermal ionization mass spectrometry and x-ray diffraction. Characterization of mantle rocks ultimately defines sources in the mantle from which the samples originated, as well as magma processes that have led to their unique characteristics. Her recent work focused on the Wemindji kimberlites in Quebec, as well as kimberlite occurrences in Ontario and Nunavut. Using the

fundamentals of her past research, Shannon is going to be involved in characterizing the rare earth mineralization of several carbonatite and alkalic rock complexes here in Northwestern Ontario, in an attempt to contribute to the ever growing rare earth metals exploration industry in North America.

Shannon is a graduate of St. Francis Xavier University (B.Sc. Hon. Geology), Lakehead University (M.Sc. Geology), and the University of Alberta (Ph.D. Earth and Atmospheric Sciences). She is excited to begin the next phase of her career at Lakehead.
