Scholarships & Awards


Every year, thanks to the generous support of industry and our alumni we are able to present a number of scholarships to our students. This year the Rainy River Resources Ltd. Geology Awards were presented to undergraduate students Natalie Zwanenburg and Sarah Davis. The Bernie Schnieders Memorial Award went to Wes Lueck, who is working on a Masters thesis investigating the alteration around the Highland Valley porphyry system in British Columbia. This fund was set up in 2005 in memory of Bernie and Wes is now the eighth student to benefit from it's support.


We were also able to award the Ben Cowan Graduate Scholarship to Emily Smyk who is undertaking her Masters on the Buckingham and White Pine porphyry deposits in Nevada and Utah as part of the same project Wes is working on, a collaboration with the Centre for Ore Deposit Research in Tasmania. Patrick Belshaw was awarded the Barrick Gold graduate scholarship. Pat is working on his

Masters examining how the fabric and microstructure developed during mineralization of shear-zone-hosted gold deposits can affect rock strength and quality. The goal of his study is to develop general qualitative relationships that can be used for mine planning and development in this type of deposit.

Michael D'Angelo, an MSc student working on the Guichon Batholith in British Columbia, was awarded a place on the twelfth SEG Foundation-sponsored Student Field Trip, "Major Copper-Molybdenum Porphyry Systems,"

Southwestern USA, March 9-16, 2014". Similarly, Jordan Baird, a third year undergraduate student, won a place on the 2014 Student-Industry Mineral Exploration Workshop (S-IMEW) that takes place each year in Sudbury.
