

Thinking about applying to the Master of Health Sciences or Master of Public Health program? Below you will find answers to frequently asked questions to assist you in deciding to apply to either of these programs.

Is previous public health / health sciences experience required?

The MPH program is geared towards working professionals to build on the knowledge foundation of persons currently working in the field of public health. The curriculum focuses on current issues in the science and/or service of public health, so that students may gain experience through opportunities in any of the fundamental disciplines that underlie public health. Though not required, preference is given to applicants who have previous experience in public health or proven experience through research and volunteer opportunities.

The MHSc program is primarily intended to prepare skilled graduates who will make a positive impact on health through involvement in research. Therefore, the degree is designed largely to prepare students who will emerge as health researchers, and will provide advanced methodological and health-related education that will enhance both their understanding of health and their ability to contribute to the advancement of health. Preference will be given to applicants who completed a thesis in their undergraduate program or have proven research experience.

The Department of Health Sciences creates and mobilizes knowledge to protect and promote health and reduce health inequities. Through applied research, community engagement, and provision of diverse learning opportunities, we help to build capacity to understand and address the complexities of both current and emerging health issues. Faculty members provide a variety of perspectives focusing on the continuum of healthcare delivery from multidisciplinary areas or research.

For both programs, preference will be given to applicants who have taken statistics and research methods courses.

How competitive are the programs?

Our Master of Public Health programs are highly over-subscribed. **Complete** applications are due in **full by midnight on February 1st**. A complete application includes a CV, statement of intentions and goals, transcripts, and *if applicable*, references, English Language requirements, CNO license, or hours verifications.

When and how do I apply?

We have one intake that begins in September. Typically, we begin to accept applications in September, and applications are due in full by midnight on February 1st.

To be considered for funding, applications must be fully completed by midnight on February 1st. Full-time completing at a distance and Flexible full-time applications are not considered for funding.

Are there scholarships or bursaries available?

We have a limited number of entrance scholarships that are allocated to high-ranking applicants admitted to our programs. Aside from submitting a complete application to the program, nothing further is required to be considered for these awards.

Some faculty do have scholarships available, and candidates should contact them directly.

Only Full-time, **on-campus** students are eligible for a Graduate Assistantship or funding.

What are the minimum admission requirements and documents required to apply?

Lakehead's Master of Public Health program is primarily intended to build on the knowledge foundation of persons working in the field of public health.

The minimum admission requirement to a Graduate program is a 4-year Bachelor's degree with second class standing (B) on their last 20 half courses or equivalent.

Typically, applicants to the Master of Health Sciences and Master of Public Health programs have a 4-year Bachelor's degree in a health-related field with at least a 75% average. Applicants who have averages below 75% may be considered if they have substantial work experience (5 or more years) in public health. Preference is given to applicants who have taken courses in statistics and research methods.

All applications to the Master of Health Sciences and Master of Public Health programs are required to submit the following general documents:

- Transcripts from postsecondary institutions

- [English Language scores](#) (if applicable) see program admission requirements as the MPH and MHSc programs have higher English Language requirements.

PhD in Health Sciences and Master of Health Sciences Applicants

- Two (2) references in support of the applicant's ability to undertake advanced study and research. These should be academic references, if possible.

Nursing Specialization

In addition to the general application documents, those applying to the **Master of Public Health with Specialization in Nursing** must also submit the following:

- Two (2) references are required for both nursing specializations, with one (1) being a clinical reference. Names and email addresses of each reference must be submitted in your application and an electronic form will be automatically sent to each referee
- Evidence of unrestricted, current registration or eligibility to register with the [College of Nurses of Ontario](#)

Are the programs offered on campus or at a distance?

The **Master of Health Sciences** program is an **on-campus, thesis-based** program that may be completed on a full-time or flexible full-time basis. The program is **not available at a distance**.

The **Master of Public Health program** is offered on a **full-time basis and can be completed on campus or at a distance**. The program is also available **at a distance on a flexible full-time basis**.

Full-time students must attend the daytime classes.

Flex-time students must attend the evening classes. Those wanting to complete the program quicker than 3 years should apply to the full-time program.

Students in the [full-time](#), on-campus stream must complete all academic requirements in 2 year (6 terms) of continuous registration.

Students in the flexible full-time, distance stream must complete all academic requirements in 4 years of continuous registration. **There is no guarantee that the program can be completed any quicker than 3 years. Please visit our [regulations](#) for more information on the number of courses flex-time students may register for in each term.**

Where can I complete the Master of Public Health practicum?

The planning of the practicum begins at least 6 months in advance and is the last component of the Master of Public Health program. While the planning is heavily student-driven, with the assistance of the Administrative Coordinator, we try to secure a practicum where the student resides. In some cases, students have had to relocate temporarily or travel longer distances.

Securing a Supervisor – MHSc Thesis Programs Only

Applicants to the **MPH** course-based programs **do not** need to secure a supervisor.

Applicants to a thesis program are encouraged to secure a potential supervisor prior to applying. Admittance is dependent on availability of full-time faculty in the Department of Health Sciences. Applicants should carefully review our full-time [faculty profiles](#) to identify faculty who do work in their area of research and reach out to them directly to discuss their availability. We ask that you only reach out to one faculty member at a time. Thank you in advance for not sending multiple emails to different faculty.

Please note, that identifying a potential supervisor in your application does not guarantee admission to the program.

Is previous research experience required to be considered for a thesis program?

Applicants to the Master of Health Sciences program should have previous research experience or have completed a thesis in their undergraduate program.

How will my average be calculated?

Averages are calculated by the Faculty of Graduate Studies by using the last 20 half courses at the 3rd and 4th year level that are most related to the program of application. Applicants may submit an updated transcript for in-process courses.

Is admittance based on grades alone?

No, the entire package is considered by the admission committee when reviewing applications. The committee considers grades, CV, letter of intentions and goals, academic and working background.

When will I find out if I have been accepted?

Offers of admission are usually sent out to the top-ranking applicants beginning in March. We hold a waitlist and make further admission offers by way of the waitlist if top-ranking applicants decline their offer. The review committee makes recommendations up to June 1.
