Admissions Requirements

- Minimum undergraduate grade of "B" average in final year
- A statement of academic and professional interests and concerns relevant to Social Justice Education; list at the top of the statement one (or more) SJE faculty member(s) whose work is relevant to your interests and concerns
- Two letters of reference: at least one university reference on your academic capacity; second letter can be a professional reference on your work background
- A sample of written work related to social justice education (previous course paper, research or community report, etc.)
- MEd applicants must have the equivalent of 12 months total of professional experience (full-time or part-time employment, community work, co-op or internship, research, etc.)
- A resumé that provides clear and complete information about the applicant's work or field experience related to their proposed studies

10 half-courses (M.Ed. Option IV) degree program to be completed 3 years (full-time) and 6 years (part-time)
