DESCRIPTION OF THE COURSE

This course is an introduction to the Finnish language. As a basic course, it is aimed at those students who wish to attain knowledge of Finnish at a beginner level, and the objective conditions will be created whereby the students can have a successful learning experience.

The course focuses on learning Finnish and Finnish culture. It introduces key concepts and basic grammatical structures intertwined with cultural elements. Emphasis will be given to basic applied language skills, pronunciation and vocabulary.

OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course, students will be able to

- Pronounce Finnish accurately
- Memorize alphabet and numbers in Finnish
- Use frequently used expressions related to areas of most immediate relevance
- Make simple questions and answer them
- Describe orally aspects of their background, immediate environment and matters of immediate needs
- Find and recognize familiar words in spoken or written text and repeat them
- Distinguish singular and plural forms in written or spoken text
- Communicate in routine tasks requiring simple and direct exchange of information on familiar matters, such as greeting, shopping and travelling

- Communicate in Finnish at Basic User A1-A2 level according to the category of Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR):

A1: Can understand and use familiar everyday expressions and very basic phrases aimed at the satisfaction of needs of a concrete type. Can introduce him/herself and others and can ask and answer questions about personal details such as where he/she lives, people he/she knows and things he/she has. Can interact in a simple way provided the other person talks slowly and is prepared to help.

A2: Can understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to areas of most immediate relevance (e.g. very basic personal and family information, shopping, local geography, employment). Can communicate in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters. Can describe in simple terms aspects of his/her background, immediate environment and matters in areas of immediate need.

METHODOLOGY

This course, delivered using strategies that are relevant, meaningful and practical, will provide students with learning experiences in Finnish language and culture. Students are encouraged to work individually and in groups in a supportive atmosphere. They will receive feedback from peers and the instructor and share the products of their learning with others. Opportunities for reading, reflection, communication and expression are also integral parts of the course. The instructor will model effective instructional strategies and will use methods that support students' learning as interactive communications, connections to quality resources, and links to other sites.
