COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the end of this course you will be be able to translate various real life problems from biology, chemistry, physics into diverse mathematical models that involve ordinary differential equations. Then, using the tools developed in the first part of the course you will be able to recognize the type of ordinary differential equation that needs solving and choose a proper method of solving it. You will have a good grasp of what is a general solution and what is a particular solution to an ordinary differential equation.

This course provides a large catalog of differential equations with their methods as well as applications to real world problems, all possible with a solid grasp of calculus methods, integration and differentiation. As a result, your calculus skills will also be improved by using them every day.

MISSED MIDTERM POLICIES
