Degree Audits **Important Notice!**

Returning students will have received a degree audit in June. These audits are generated by a software program that highlights the credits you obtained toward your degree and those that are still outstanding. The program works well for the most part, but you should know that it *does not work perfectly*. We suggest that you review your transcript, comparing it carefully with the requirements for your degree as set out in the University's Calendar.

If you think the audit did not count your credits accurately, see Dr. Blahuta and, if necessary, he can contact Enrolment Services to review the automated audit and confirm your credits.

In particular, we have had some difficulty this year with students trying to register for Senior Seminar courses (PHIL 4811). The Senior Seminar is offered in a variety of sections with varying content and different instructors. Three sections of 4811 are required for the Honours Degree, but we encourage students to take as many as their interests and timetables allow. The University, however, has a regulation which prevents students from registering in the same course more than three times. The system has been reading different sections of 4811 as one and the same course, thus blocking registration for students who already have three 4811 courses on their transcript. If this happens to you, ... let us know and we will get you registered manually in the section of your choice.

On March 17, 2016 the Department hosted the **2016 Morris Lecture**. Our speaker was Professor Paul Colilli of Laurentian University. The title of his talk, "Giorgio Agamben and the Legitimacy of Angelology" enticed a sizable crowd (despite a snow storm) who came out to hear Professor Colilli's presentation. Agamben is a contemporary Italian philosopher whose work relates elements of early and late Christian mythology and symbology to contemporary global politics.

The Morris Lecture: A History

Guest speakers are an important part of the life of a university and a vital source of intellectual enrichment for students and faculty alike. However, a guest lecture is a treat we enjoy all too rarely at Lakehead simply because Thunder Bay's geographical isolation makes it prohibitively expensive to bring in visiting lecturers. That is why we, in the Philosophy Department, have made every effort to maintain the **Morris Lecture Series**, which has brought distinguished speakers to our campus for over three decades.

The **Morris Lectures** are named for William S. Morris (1916-1983), a member of the Philosophy Department at Lakehead University who served from the founding years of philosophy at Lakehead until his retirement in 1982. He died the following year, and the Department established a speaker series in his honour, initially with contributions from members of the Department and the Morris family. In recent years, the **Morris Lecture** has been supported with financial help from the Dean of Social Sciences and Humanities, with our thanks. While Professor Morris is long gone, his scholarly work lives on. The PhD dissertation that he completed at the University of Chicago in 1955, *The Young Jonathan Edwards: A Reconstruction*, was published in 2005 (Eugene: Wipf & Stock).

Philosophy Welcomes Our Contact Lecturers for Fall 2016

Miranda Niittynen is a doctoral candidate at the University of Western Ontario, Department of Women's Studies and Feminist Research. Her dissertation, entitled "*Un/Dead Animal Art: Ethical Encounters with Rogue Taxidermy Sculpture*," focuses on the contemporary pop-surrealist art movement known as "*rogue taxidermy*" founded along the Minnesota border. Interested in topics such as alterity, ethics, and 'the animal question' in contemporary philosophy, her dissertation considers the ways in which alternative forms of taxidermy sculpture have the potential to produce ontological interruptions and disrupt normalized forms of violence inflicted on nonhuman animal bodies. Her research and publications examine unconventional and experimental style found in the arts, as she has written on topics such as animals in performance art, rogue taxidermy sculpture and drag performance in Canadian-Italian dance (co-authored with Dr. Clara Sacchetti-Dufresne). She is currently writing on an experimental film that reinterprets the footage of Thomas Edison's electrocution of circus elephant '*Topsy*' at Coney Island in 1903.

Yuri Forbes-Petrovich is a doctoral candidate at the University of Western Ontario, Center for the Study of Theory and Criticism. His dissertation entitled "*Given Nothing: The Problem of Religious Contingency in Post-Natural Philosophy*" enhances his current research interests. He has taught, published or presented on the areas and topics of: Continental Philosophy, Philosophy of Religion/Christianity, Greek Philosophy (Plato, Stoicism, Cynicism, Neoplatonism), Patristics, Love, Literature, Contemporary Political Theory and Application, Marxism, Ethics, Ecology, LGBTQ+ Issues, Psychoanalysis, Occult and Paranormal, and Existentialism.

He is a returning instructor to the Department, and will be teaching Philosophy 1118 Philosophy of the Occult and Paranormal, and Philosophy 2013 Environmental Philosophy.

Film and Contemporary Philosophy

This course will provide students a space to analyze and interpret traditional and experimental styles in film that can be used to further philosophical discussion. Course topics and themes include (but are not limited to) affect, existential angst, alienation, (inter-)subjectivity and the abject.

Coupled with the philosophical writings of Maurice Merleau-Ponty, Gilles Deleuze, Julia Kristeva and Frantz Fanon (to name only a few), students will be asked to bridge the connection between film and philosophical thought

and to consider the possibility and limits of film to encapsulate questions concerning personal identity, recognition and difference.
