Course Description:

This course will focus on how the sociological imagination can offer important insights useful in understanding our everyday/everynight lives. Lectures and readings will emphasize the interplay between work and leisure to help students understand the importance of class, race, and gender in various settings -- on the job, at school, at a sporting event, as users of public transportation and social services, as taxpayers, in front of cell phone, computer and television screens, as shoppers at the mall, at a party, at the neighbourhood bar, and so on.

A Note on Course Content:

It is next to impossible (certainly it is impractical) to list and cover the myriad subject matter falling under the course title. Literally every activity that human beings engage in while living their everyday/everynight lives is a possible focal point in our sociological studies. I shall (we shall) expand upon this when we meet as a class for the first time.

Course Objective:

The sole objective of this course is to benefit students by making them aware of the sociological side of their everyday activities, providing students with some insights regarding how to be critical social analysts.

Evaluation (Grading):

Students will be evaluated according to how well they achieve the above course objective.
