## **Course Description and Objectives**

### **Preparation**

There are no assignments in this course other than a mid- term Test and a Final Examination. The Mid-Term Test is worth 30% and the Final examination is worth 40%. The Mid-term test and the final examination must be taken on the assigned dates. NO request for supplemental tests or alternative dates will be accepted. The Mid-Term test will consist of 8 short answer questions (You answer 5) and the Final examination will consist of 10 short answer questions (You answer 8).

Note: Each question answer must be (single-spaced typed) minimum one page but cannot exceed more than two pages. Questions for each test will remain available for a specified period and must be completed within that period.

The Mid Term Test will cover the materials discussed in the first 5 modules and corresponding readings from the text book (refer to Reading Schedule below). The mid-term test questions will be released on October 23, at 6 a.m. EST. Responses are due no later than October 24 at 11.59 p.m. EST. Submit completed test through the DROPBOX. If you encounter technical difficulties submitting your test please send me an email.

The Final Examination will cover the materials discussed in modules 6 to 12 and the corresonding readings from the text book. The final exam questions will be released on December 9, at 6 a.m. EST.Responses are due no later than December 11 at 6.a.m. EST. Submit completed exam through the DROPBOX. If you encounter technical difficulties submitting your exam please send me an email.

#### **Discussion Forums (30% Marks)**

DISCUSSION FORUMS: Marks on Discussion will be based on QUANTITY (number of threads/postings in each forum) and QUALITY of Comments.

The discussion forums are areas where you can review concepts, discuss difficulties you may be having about a particular concept, collaborate with peers, or to discuss just about anything you want to share with your fellow students. For participation marks in Discussion Forums, students are required to comment on each topic of the week. Students have one week to respond to others in discussion forum. Students have to debate, raise questions and coment on each others' responses. . **DISCUSSION FORUM WILL OPEN/CLOSE EACH WEEK ON MONDAY AT 6 a.m.** 

I will be visiting the Discussion Forums regularly but grading will be done in total at the end of the semester.

## Tips for Participating on a Discussion Board

- -Think ideas through before responding.
- -You do not want to respond to be considered flaming. It often helps to outline responses before responding.
- -Be polite and respectful.

- -Use good communication skills. Keep your comments concise, but do meet the requirements posted for discussion by the instructor.
- -Avoid brief affirmations such as "Amen", "Ditto", and "I agree".
- -Don't quote or copy long passages from a previous post. Quote only the relevant portions to make your response clear. Pay careful attention to instructions. Be sensitive with your use of language.
- -Use subject lines in your post to keep the flow going for a certain discussion item. Be sure to change the subject line if you are changing the direction of the discussion.
- -Try to stay on track and respond directly to comments being made. (Adapted from Dakota State University, Distance Education Orientation website)

Mandatory participation in a minimum of 10 Discussion forums/sessions is required to obtain participation marks.

Students will participate in these forums by accessing the "Discussion Area" portion of their online course. For participation marks in Discussion Forums, students are required to comment on each week's topic written in the module and text book reading.
