This seminar course is designed for those students who are fulfilling the requirements of the Honours degree program in Political Science. We will focus on the development of Canadian political thought through the work of a variety of Canadian thinkers and political activists who have asked and answered questions about Canadian identity, human rights, the Quebec question, indigenous politics, constitutionalism, the environment, international relations, federalism, justice, and more. There are recurring themes in Canadian Political Thought around the questions of ideological focus, American and multinational trade, immigration and settlement, and more. We will focus our reading on the two class texts and each student will be responsible for locating and sharing other readings that amplify or reinforce the assigned readings.

CHAPTER SUMMARY AND ANALYSIS – Each student will prepare 2 X 5 page summary and analysis of the chapters in the course text. They will also locate and share at least one other scholarly article or book chapter that complements the Chapter.

BOOK REVIEW – Each student will prepare a 7-8 page review of *The European Roots of Canadian Identity* by Philip Resnik. Details will be handed out in the 2nd week of class.

FINAL PAPER – This will be based on the readings that are assigned for this course.
